The Coroner, Dr. Charters, has rendered a bill for services amounting to \$180, which the Finance Committee of the Councils refused to pay and referred to the City Attor-ney to ascertain his opinion as to the right of the Coroner to make a charge of \$25 for making an au-topsy. The City Attorney has re-plied to the committee saying:

The coroner has a right to charge \$5 when he simply acts as coroner, and he has a right to call in physicians if it appears necessary, These physicians are to be paid a

These physicians are to be paid a reasonable compensation for their services, but if the coroner is a physician he is provided for in section 3950 of the Code, which says:

"He shall be paid §3 for acting simply as Coroner, but when he, the said Coroner, who is a physician, acts also as a physician and makes an actual expansation of the deal au actual examination of the dead body, his compensation is \$5.'" He says the Coroner cannot make
