

A RIVER FATALITY IN BERKLEY.

Mate Rylett, of the Sloop Annie K. Tiller, Accidentally Drowned.

ARRIVAL OF BRITAIN, OF SNAPPER GUT.

Hon. J. E. Booker Inaugurates His Canvass—Supervisors Hold Their Postponed Meeting—Only Ten Paupers in the Poorhouse—Pertinent Notes and Gossip.

Suffolk, Va., Oct. 29.—(Special.)—Mate Rylett, mate on sloop Annie K. Tiller, one of the oyster boats of W. N. McAnge & Co., was to-day drowned in Nansemond river, near Holiday's Point. The sloop was endeavoring to approach the side of an anchored oyster skiff and in the attempt Rylett, who was standing near the rail, fell overboard between the two crafts, but not sufficiently near for him to grasp either. The Tiller was under headway and before assistance could be rendered the man who was struggling with the waves had succumbed and sunk. The crew made a determined but unsuccessful attempt to save him. Mr. McAnge was notified of the fatality and immediately left for the scene to drag the river for his body, which had not been recovered when this report closed. Rylett was a very respectable colored man, had been recently married and resided in No. 60 Church street.

HOLDER COUNTY POOR.—Mr. A. T. Holland, superintendent of the Upper Parish poorhouse, was in town to-day, and in conversation said that there are now only ten pauper inmates. The number of actual inmates in the almshouse is materially lessened by reason of the fact that a number of the indigent class are furnished with monthly allowances at their respective houses. This method, says the superintendent, while it causes a diminution in the ranks at the almshouse, where their support would cost the county more than the monthly allowance tendered, causes applications for aid from many citizens whose pride would forbid their entering a poor house and thereby more expensive in the end.

POSTPONED MEETING.—The County Board of Supervisors had their postponed October 4 meeting to-day in the Courthouse. Present: E. D. Brinkley, J. W. Everett and J. F. Eley. In the absence of the chairman, Walter Jordan, of Sleepy Hole district, Mr. Brinkley occupied the chair. No new business was brought before the body, whose time was taken in the regular routine work of auditing accounts and approving bills. Dr. Thomas H. Barnes, ex-county Treasurer, did not appear before the board, but in a special meeting on Wednesday, November 6, was named as the time to settle the county's accounts with the ex-Treasurer. The board adjourned about 4 o'clock till the special meeting.

INAUGURATING A CANVASS.—Hon. J. E. Booker, candidate for the House, to-day began his canvass for the campaign in Whaleville. Although he has no opposition he will visit various parts of the county with the view of arousing the party to the situation, and dispelling any apathy which may exist in the ranks. It is desired that there be a respectable vote held in this county, as Colonel R. E. Boykin, for the Senate has an active opponent in the person of Mr. John R. Dokes, the Fusionist candidate, who was named at the Windsor conference, and whose friends are said to be making a still hunt in his interest. There is a safe Democratic majority in the district, and the only question is to get the voters to the polls.

The revival is continuing at the Baptist Church, with good prospects. The first four sermons of the pastor were to Christians and the remaining appeals will be directed to sinners. Good music is being rendered by the combined choir.

To investigate the charges lodged against a number of prisoners recently sent on, a grand jury will be summoned at the next term of the County Court.

Judge Gunter, of Accomac will arrive in Suffolk to-morrow and convene a special term of the Circuit Court for Judge Prentiss, who is in Isle of Wight. Mr. Joseph Theobald and Miss Josie Ernest Winborne will to-morrow be married at the residence of the brides parents, West Kilby street, extended.

Among the notable addresses noted on the Commercial Hotel register to-day is "W. M. Brittain, Snapper Gut." A guard from the North Carolina State farm came to Suffolk to remove Leroy Billups, the escaped convict, who was arrested here for burglary. When shown into Billups' cell in the county jail the latter was fully identified, and the recognition was mutual. Billups says he is glad to return.

ATLANTIC CITY.

The Local Board of Improvement met Monday afternoon at 5 o'clock, with the following members present: Messrs. C. Brooks Johnson (Chairman), Helmsland, Hitchings, Lewellyn and Nottingham. Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Committee on Fire Alarm was continued. A resolution was passed by the Board authorizing Mr. Johnson to take steps to provide money for the monthly payment of teachers. The teachers, through Mr. Johnson, thanked the Board for increase in their pay. Certain matters placed in charge of committees at last meeting were reported as having received attention. A requisition for certain articles for the colored school, signed by Messrs. Conway and Newbill, was referred to Messrs. Lewellyn and Johnson. The matter of increase of the janitor's pay was continued.

Mr. Johnson reported arrangements made with Captain J. E. Miller for shade trees in front of the public school building.

Mr. Riddle, Engineer of Sixth Ward, presented an estimate of grading, etc., for a certain extent of Colley avenue, which work Mr. Denby bids to do for \$95. On motion, passed with the proviso that Mr. Denby be responsible for damages liable in the event of interest to the reading public were appropriately disposed of, properly approved bills allowed and then the Board adjourned.

Rev. W. S. Long, D. D., presented a letter of transfer from the North Carolina and Virginia Christian Conference to this body, and, on motion, he was received. Several petitions were read and referred to the various committees.

Rev. Dr. Ray, of Chestnut Street M. E. Church, Berkley, was present. He was invited to a seat as a deliberative member.

Rev. W. H. Ford, of the North Carolina Conference, was also present, and was invited to a seat.

It was decided that the daily meeting be held at 10 a. m. and close at 2 p. m.

Ministerial reports were called for, and each minister present read a report of his labors during the Conference year.

Fraternal messengers who had visited sister conferences were called upon and gave an account of their visits to the various conferences.

It was decided that this body meet with the Christian Church at Suffolk in its next annual session. Rev. W. S. Long, D. D., was elected to deliver the annual address at that time.

Rev. N. L. Newman was appointed a committee to present names who shall be elected delegates to the next session of the general convention.

It was moved and carried that the pastors and delegates be appointed a Committee on Religious Exercises.

The report of the Executive Committee was read, and the Convention adjourned at 2 p. m. to meet at 7:30 o'clock this evening, when Rev. J. P. Barrett, D. D., will deliver the annual sermon.

There were about forty-five delegates and visitors present to-day, and more are expected to-morrow.
