SAFE IN PORT.

City of Mexico Arrives at Galveston.

ment Prevails.

The Rumors and Apprehensions That Reigned Everywhere.

GALVESTON, TEXAS, March 23-1 P. M .-The steamer City of Mexico, with General Grant and his party on board, arrived here safely shortly after noon to-day. There was an immense crowd collected on the lookout for the steamer, and the joy and The Man Who Did Not Know excitement is intense.

Besides the General and Mrs. Grant, the party included Colonel Fred. Grant and family, General Phil, Sheridan and family, Minister to Mexico Foster and family, Mr. Byron Andrews, correspondent of the Chicago Inter:Ocean, and an artist for Harper's Weekly.

NO GROUND FOR FRAR.

NEW OBLEANS, March 23 .- There is not a shadow of reason to apprehend a disaster to the steamer City of Mexico, having on board the Grant party. Under no circum-stances was she due at Galveston before last night or to-day and if she was delayed by a norther in making her connections at Tampico and Tuxcan, required by her mail contract, she might be delayed one or two days longer. The steamer is one of the staunchest afloat in the Gulf and her Captain, McIntosh, one of the best Gult navigators alive, and on board he maintains the discipline of the navy.

NO TIDINGS AT WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, March 23,-There is considerable excitement here over the nonarrival at Galveston of the steamer City of Mexico with Gen. Grant and party on board, and fears are entertained in conse quence that the vessel has been lost. The bulletin boards are narrowly watched for additional information. Up to 1 a. m. no intelligence except that conveyed in N. A. P. dispatches has been received.

NO REPORT AT 10 A. M. NEW ORLEANS, March 23--10 A. M .-

Nothing has yet been heard of the City of Mexico, but she may get into Galveston to-day if nothing happens to detain her. On her last trip she was held twenty-four hours at Tampico and eighteen at Bagdad. A like detention occurring this trip would prevent her reaching Galveston before to-morrow night. There is yet no ground for any apprehension of disaster.
