Dennison's Movements.

The custom which has lately obtained, of sending newspaper reporters in the track of stump speakers, to take down their speeches, verbatim, as they are delivered, must be very provoking to the speakers themselves, and especially to such an one as Mr. Dennison. In old times, a candidate who was destitute of originality, could deliver the same address to a dozen audiences, successively, in the State or district which he was canvassing, without fear of detection; or, if the people were divided on any subject, he could proclaim one set of opinions in one section of the country, and another set in another, suiting himself to the locality in which he might be, without fear of being called to account therefor. But in these days, when speeches are published and scattered broadcast over the land, it is difficult to practice such a species of deception successfully.

Dennison is a man who is all things to all men, and always endeavors to accommodate himself to the popular sentiment of the community he addresses in his political perambulations through the State. When he enters a place he holds up his hand to find which way the wind blows, and then conducts himself accordingly. His movements are as sure an indication of the way the wind is as the position of a shuttlecock on a barn. For instance, at Ironton, he declared himself against the Sub Treasury law, and asserted that he could beat Judge Ranney one hundred thousand votes upon that question, but in Muskingum county, where he was aware that the people were strongly in favor of such a law, he is reported to have expressed himself in an entirely different manner, and to have given them to understand that he did not object to its provisions; thus attempting to secure the support of two classes of voters by proclaiming two sets of opinions.

It is almost too late to attempt to practice such a ruse as this, and it would be advisable for Mr. Dennison to decide at once where he will stand, and hereafter to hold to the same doctrine, if he does not want to place himself in a ridiculous light before the eyes of all intelligent men who keep posted on the political affairs of the day. It is notorious that he is bitterly opposed to the Sub Treasury system, and by attempting to carry a different impression in certain places, he has shown himself to be a political trickster who will do any thing to secure the office for which he is a candidate.

MOVING ORR.—Some fellow writing from Sandusky to the Cincinnati Gazette, says that Ranney and Payne failed to meet their engagement to take on the evening of the 29th inst. It was within the scope of the people of Sandusky to learn that Judge Ranney was confined to his bed by sickness, and that Mr. Payne was absent in the East on business. The Gazette's correspondent knew this, but he followed his natural bent by stating that "they made it convenient to stay away." He further gabbles about Mr. Valandigham being "substituted," and that he went on his usual "style," when he "scooped off" Mr. V. has a "style" of saying some very unpleasant things of mean people, and the fellow is not to be blamed for refusing to listen to a scolding. He acted discreetly in "moving off," probably the only sensible thing he did that evening.
