Village Council.

Council met Tuesday evening. Full board present, except Trustee Van Arsdale and Attorney Brown.

Petition of Chris. Osier for appointment as Marshal and Wm. Wiggins for night watchman was received, and ordered placed on file.

The Board of Water Commissioners submitted their annual report, showing expenditures for various purposes as follows.

Owing to the leaking of the 12 inch pipe, the work of the Michigan Pipe company in laying the pipes, has not been accepted and there is yet due that company \$3,445.90. Also due contractors for reservoir, \$30.00. This would make the total cost of the waterworks to date, \$31,833.03. There remained on hand of the fuel to the amount of \$256.12, making the cost of fuel to date \$520.13, an average cost of \$2 per day. The pay of engineers and secretary's salaries amount to \$3.89 per day, add to the above amounts the estimated cost of oil, packing, etc., brings the total cost per day up to \$6.18.

The receipts for water rents amount to \$75.73.

The report gives an estimate of \$4,700 needed over and above the amount appropriated, and recommends that that amount be raised by tax. The report was received and fifty copies ordered printed in pamphlet form.

Trustee McArthur offered a resolution which was adopted, that all contracts for street openings, grading, graveling and ditching, be let to the lowest responsible bidder, where the amount to be expended exceeds \$25.

A resolution was adopted instructing the street commissioner to repair without delay all broken or dangerous places in sidewalks, crosswalks or streets.

A resolution was adopted that a contract be entered into between the village and county for care of prisoners, under sentence, in the county jail.

The street commissioner was authorized to pay \$1.75 per day for laborers on the south corporation line sewer.

A motion was adopted allowing the Independent Church the use of the Town Hall for church and Sunday school until Nov. 1st at \$2.00 per Sunday.

The standing rules of old council were adopted.

Street commissioner ordered to clear sidewalk from Wetmore & Paddock's store to Elm street.

Trustees Humphrey and Blake, with the President, were appointed a committee to arrange salaries of village officers.

Upon motion the amount of bonds of the village treasurer was increased from \$10,000 to \$15,000.

The President was authorized to contract with Board of Supervisors for board and keeping of prisoners under sentence.

Cheboygan's Temperature.

As we hear people comparing the winter just passed with former winters in this county, and there seems to be quite a wide difference of opinion as to this, when compared with former winters, perhaps the following comparative table of the four winter months for the last five years, may give some information on the subject, containing as it does the average range of the thermometer taken at sunrise, mid-day and at sunset of each day; the average daily temperature for each month, and the average daily temperature for the four months noted of each winter, the coldest day of each month, the snow fall, and water contained in the snow and rain for the month, and the number of days the thermometer has been at zero and below, with the total amount of snow that fell in each of the above named winters.

In connection with the above we thought the following in regard to the opening of navigation would be of interest, the information being gathered from the files of the TRIBUNE:

- 1876—The St. Joseph was the first to arrive, April 20th.
- 1877—Prop. Maine, April 24th.
- 1878—Prop. Menominee, March 23d. The steambarge Snook passed through the straits March 15th.
- 1879—Prop. St. Joseph arrived April 14th.
- 1880—The Marine City arrived April 4th, and on the 5th the Granite State of the N. T. line from Chicago, being the first boat through the straits.
- 1881—The Van Raalte cleared for Mackinac and St. Ignace, April 29th and the propellers Hurd and Fremont arrived down from the Sault, May 3d.
- 1882—The Van Raalte cleared for Port Huron, March 17th. The Flora arrived off this port March 23th, where she stuck in the ice until the 30th, when she made port.
