The services at the Presbyterian church during the past week have been very interesting and well attended. Mr. Barrier has a very peculiar, concise and clear way of interpreting Scripture language into practical everyday thought and life. His sermons on the general judgment and on Heaven and hell were marvelous and in the way in which he set forth man's relation to sin, redemption, and God according to the Bible, science, philosophy, reason and conscience. Every possible objection that could be brought against the teachings of the church were met and answered beyond the possibility of refutation. He showed very clearly that God never damns anybody but that sin damns. He also showed that God does not shut men from Heaven but that they voluntarily shut themselves out of heaven. It would be impossible to think that a human being who did not love God here, who would not attend His services and to whom the things of God were distasteful could enjoy God in Heaven. It would be worse than hell to such people to be compelled to stay in heaven with God, the angels Jesus and with the good people who have gone there. Every person makes his own heaven or hell by his acceptance or rejection of Jesus.

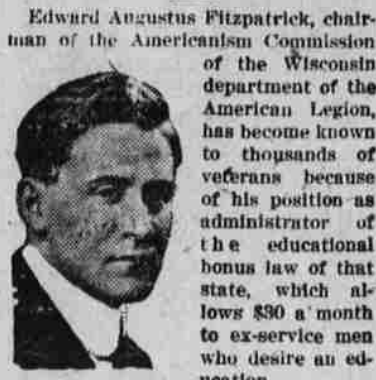
Nor does Mr. Barrier believe in a hell of fire and brimstone. These are symbolic terms to symbolize the sufferings of hell. The sufferings will be remorse of conscience, the fires of an unquenchable memory and the burnings of unsatisfied desire. And since symbols give but faint ideas of the real, what then must be the sufferings of the unrepentant. He thinks the same of heaven. And when we interpret the symbolic language used of it, its joys must be exceedingly great. Could these facts be placed before the people of our city as he placed them before the congregations which assembled to hear him, they would have wonderful effect. FITZPATRICK IS BUSY MAN

Chairman of Americanism Commission of Wisconsin is Administrator of Educational Bonus Law.



Edward Augustus Fitzpatrick, chairman of the Americanism Commission of the Wisconsin department of the American Legion, has become known to thousands of veterans because of his position as administrator of the educational bonus law of that state, which allows \$90 a month to ex-service men who desire an education. Although he is only thirty-seven years old, Mr. Fitzpatrick has had exceptional experience in the field of educational administration. He is a graduate of the New York City training school for teachers and received three degrees from Columbia university. Following his university study, Mr. Fitzpatrick was a teacher in New York public and high schools and later became connected with the New York training school for public service. Mr. Fitzpatrick was assigned to the Wisconsin board of public affairs for educational investigations and afterwards became executive secretary of the commission of practical training for public service and a director of the society for promotion of training for public service.

During the war, Mr. Fitzpatrick served as a major of infantry and was in charge of draft administration in Wisconsin. Since January 1919, he has been secretary of the Wisconsin state board of education. He is the author of a number of books and articles on educational problems. A member of the Madison, Wis., Post of the Legion, Mr. Fitzpatrick has served as chairman of various state committees and is now chairman of the state publicity committee, in addition to his duties in the field of Americanism.

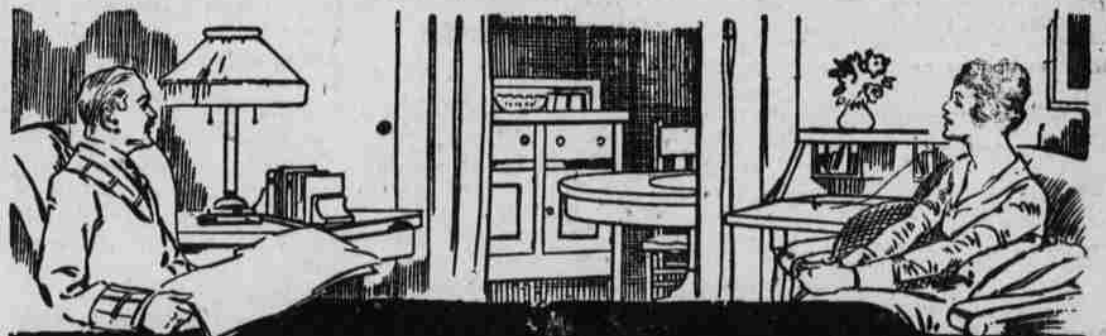
