**ROAD NOTICE**

TAKE NOTICE, That a legal petition signed by H. M. Goss and other householders of Liberal City and Liberal Township, in said County, has been presented to the Board of County Commissioners, praying for the location of a public road, as follows, viz:

Beginning at the intersection of the C. R. I. & P. Ry. Co., south right-of-way line with the Kansas & Oklahoma state line, running thence northeasterly adjacent to said south right-of-way line to the intersection of the half-section line running north and south through section five, thirty-five, thirty-three; thence north on said half section line, crossing the C. R. I. & P. railway tracks and the K. & O. railway tracks to the intersection of Clay Avenue in the City of Liberal, Kansas. Also beginning at the northeast corner of the southeast quarter of section 5-35-33, running thence west to the half-section line to the intersection of the road way above described. Said roads to be 66 feet in width.

And that said Board, acting as viewers, will meet at the point of beginning of said proposed road on the second day of March, 1922, and proceed to view said road as the law directs, at which time and place all persons interested may attend and have a hearing. In case said viewers

fail to meet on the day designated, they may meet on the following day, as provided by law, without further notice.
