1000 MILE TRIP FOR 41 KANSAS BOY SCOUTS

Who wouldn't be a Boy Scout in Liberal, Kansas! A first class scout, that is, because only that kind are eligible to accompany the Scout Tours which promise to be annual events. But here's the whole story:

The Boy Scouts of Liberal, Kansas, were organized in 1920. To encourage the movement, Mr. John W. Baughman, one of Liberal's prominent business men, organized and financed forty-two boys on a camping trip into Oklahoma. So successful did this prove, that Mr. Baughman undertook to finance another camping trip, but on a more elaborate scale, the following summer, with the understanding that only first-class scouts would be eligible as members.

With a ten day outing as the incentive, the boys made every effort to qualify, and the membership of the local Scout organization had reached the century mark by June 1921. Of this number, forty-one had reached the standing of first class scouts, and consequently were qualified to accompany the tour. Including officers and drivers the party numbered exactly fifty. Three Reo Speed Wagons were commissioned to carry the party, one hauling the baggage and camping apparatus and several boys, the other two carrying only passengers.

The trip as originally planned called for a tour which would take in five states, Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Colorado, and Kansas, covering a distance of over one thousand miles. The proposed route would take them through some of the most wild and rugged districts of the Rocky Mountains, at times reaching an altitude of ten thousand feet. And the time allowed was only ten days!

Everything was carried out true to schedule. On the morning of June 14 the party left Liberal, and were home again by the evening of June 23. In the mean time they had covered a thousand miles of travel, passed thru a score of towns, enjoyed the pleasures of camp life and visited scenes of beauty and educational interest, all without the slightest mishap or illness.

The 1922 tour will be started about the 16th of July, and about fifty or sixty boys will make up the party.—The Reo Review.

RAILROAD BOOM IN WEST

Turn to your map of Kansas and you will note that the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railway runs through Haskell County. Sublette and Satanta are on this road and are the only two towns in the county that are on the railroad. You will readily see by tracing it, that this road gives direct connections with Dodge City, Great Bend, Hutchinson, Wichita and Kansas City, thus reaching the main markets of the State and the west.

In addition to this road the south western part of Kansas is experiencing a big railroad building boom. The Kansas and Oklahoma is building out of Liberal, Kansas, northwest to the Colorado state line, a distance of about seventy miles. Also the same road is building a connection with the Wichita Falls and Northwestern at Forgan, Oklahoma, about 30 miles southeast of Liberal, thus opening the Gulf Coast markets to this country. This will stimulate competition and will result no doubt in a better price for our farm products.

However, more directly are we interested in the Santa Fe extension of the line that runs through this county. It is being built out of Satanta some sixty miles, in a western direction toward the Colorado line. In doing this it penetrates Grant and Stanton Counties, which heretofore have had no railroad.

Work on these new lines is under way and the steel is being laid. There is no joker in the building of these two roads. A vast territory will be opened up and this land is yet cheap, but will not remain so very long. With these new roads southwestern Kansas is going to undergo another wonderful development. This is the time to get some of this cheap land.

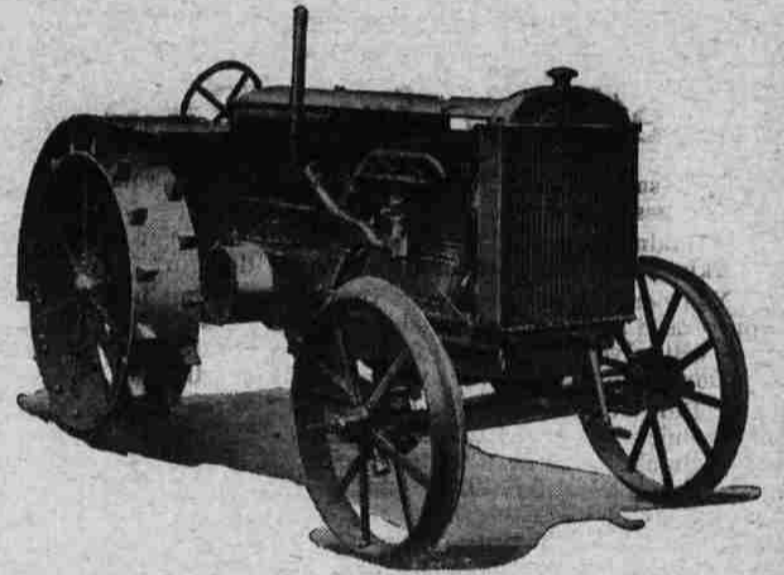
