

# GAYLEY DECLARES PEACE IS STILL 3 YEARS AWAY

LECTURER WHO HAS BEEN  
2 YEARS AT FRONT, SAYS  
END OF KAISERISM IS  
NOT TO BE HOPED FOR  
UNTIL JULY, 1921.

(From Tuesday's Daily.)

Dr. George M. Gayley who lectured to a capacity house at the Elks theatre last night, told his audience a number of startling facts about the big war, and made the prediction that the world conflict will not end before July, 1921. Mr. Gayley would seem in a position to speak authoritatively, having spent two years within the sound of the big guns on the Flanders front, and having rubbed elbows with the evidences of the sort of Kultur which Kaiser Wilhelm is at present endeavoring to inflict upon the whole of civilization.

The war will not be won, said the speaker, until every man, woman and child in the United States has reached an acute realization of the fact that America has at present on her hands a job of such proportions as has never been equalled in the history of the world. And every man, woman and child is going to be brought face to face with the terrible prospects of a ten or twenty-year war if the nation does not rally to the support of the Allied cause, either by physical or financial means.

It was not an address that Gayley gave last night—neither was it an oration. Rather, it was a straightforward story of the ways and wherefores of the war, the story as told by one man to another in an informal but convincing manner. There was a punch in every statement, a "kick," as it were, that resounded throughout the spacious hall and echoed and re-echoed as the listeners slowly went their ways after the meeting.

Gayley is professor of English at the Berkeley institution, but with his other duties he has found sufficient time to study the war as probably few other men in the far west have studied it. Surely, no other man who has appeared before an audience in this city has been so well versed, so well informed as to the causes, the objectives and the effects of the titanic struggle now waging in Europe, and when, in the course of his heart-to-heart talk with Arizonaans last night, he found it advisable to assail Prussianism and kaiserism, he introduced convincing evidence in the form of government literature or the like to substantiate his every claim.

## He Had the Evidence

Probably the most convincing bit of information as to the German aims, their long preparation for the present conflict and their lustful desires yet placed before an Arizona audience, was given by Gayley when he read from "Conquests and Kultur" as published by the bureau of information of the United States government. In this passage, it was clearly shown that the German kaiser has long entertained a hatred for this government and its peoples—that as far back as 1898 the idea was conceived in the minds of German rulers for world conquests, world domination and world subjugation.

That America and her Allies cannot win this fight within the next one, two or three years was the convincing argument used by Gayley in his effort to impress upon his hearers the importance of subscribing readily and willingly to the Liberty Loan campaign that started Saturday.

"Unless we do our bit, we shall have a seven or ten-year war in front of us instead of a three or four-year war," declared the talker in his opening remarks.

"We cannot hope to end this fight quickly. It will not be ended by July 1 of this year, nor by July 1 of 1919, nor, even yet, by July 1 of 1920, for a peace effected within that space of time would be a German concocted peace, a peace founded on a German victory."

## A Three-Year War

"The most optimistic acme of our hopes is to end the war by July 1 of 1921. It is not pessimism that I speak for we are opposed to the most eminently skillful beast that God ever let live on this planet. And when we end this war—as we surely will—let us hope that it will be the end of all wars for many, many years to come."

"A peace, founded on American ideals cannot be consummated until the Hohenzollerns and Hapsburgs are crushed for once and for all times. Any other peace would not be worth the consideration."

"France entered this war to protect herself. So did Great Britain, and America, lastly, is fighting a war of self preservation—preservation of liberty, preservation of the spirit of American freedom."

"Your own State, Arizona, was threatened. Arizona was to be used by the Germans as a pawn to Mexico, even though Germany did not possess this commonwealth—but expected to possess it within a year or so."

"When this war first broke out, we thought that it was no affair of ours, that it was a European struggle in which we could not be interested. It

has since been shown, however, that the whole excuse of the invasion of France was a lie.

"Germany today is the winner. She dominates two-thirds of the European continent. She has accomplished the first tide of her world domination."

"Had it not been for the powerful British fleet, there is no doubt but that this country of ours would have been directly attacked long ago. We joined the forces of the Lord in the nick of time. There would have been no Monroe Doctrine except the German Monroe Doctrine."

Ours a Great Task  
"After we have defeated the German army, we must teach the ignorant of Russia, the Russia which is today guided by fanatics or tyrants. They are like our own I. W. W. and Bolsheviks. Why in the name of God are they our enemies?"

"We must hereafter insist that persons coming to these United States shall speak and write the English language after a given length of time. Even today there is a mighty welding of peoples in the United States."

## Must Send 3,500,000

"It will take at least 3,500,000 men before we can hope to play a deciding factor in this fight. Until we land that many men in France, our efforts will be merely of a defensive nature, bolstering up the battered condition of the French, British and Italian forces."

"Austria is the weak link in the chain and the quicker we drive in that direction, the quicker will we break the backbone of the German strength."

## YAVAPAI PIONEER DIES AT HOME IN PHOENIX

George Helu, one of the pioneers of Arizona and for many years a resident of Yavapai county, died on Thursday at his home in Phoenix. Mr. Helu was a native of Ontario. He came to California in the gold days, and in 1875 he came to the territory of Arizona. He engaged in the cattle business for a time, and then took up sheep raising on the lower Agua Fria.

The deceased is survived by his widow, three daughters, Mrs. Ellen Hornback, Mrs. Charlotte Hornback and Miss Edna Helu, all of whom are residents of Phoenix. Mr. Helu was 72 years of age at the time of his death, and his many friends in Yavapai will be sorry to learn of the passing of this popular old-timer.

## DIVORCES ASKED ON GROUNDS OF DESERTION

### TWO HUSBANDS APPEAL TO COURT FOR FREEDOM FROM MATRIMONIAL TIES WHICH BIND THEM TO DESERTING WIVES.

Two self-confessed mis-mated husbands filed divorce suits in the Superior court yesterday afternoon, both of the plaintiffs charging their wives with desertion. Henry J. Cooksey and Katherine Cooksey were married in Prescott in September, 1912, and the wife is said to have quit the job on or about June 22, 1915. The husband's complaint states that the lady deserted him without cause, and a decree is asked.

John Shivers of Jerome Junction, is accusing of Nellie Shivers of a bit of neglect which is said to have occurred more than ten years ago. Mr. and Mrs. Shivers were married in Missouri in 1902 and came to Yavapai county a short while later. Mrs. Shivers, according to the complaint, left home in December, 1907, without cause, and has since that time resided outside the State of Arizona. Shivers wants a divorce from his wife whom he has not seen for a decade.

### Named Administrator

Jose Manuel Gago was yesterday appointed administrator of the estate of the late Hilario Rodriguez. The estate is valued at \$3,000, and Gago has given a bond in the sum of \$6,000.

### Committed to Asylum

Francisco Garcia, a Mexican who had been employed at one of the nearby camps, was on Monday afternoon committed to the State insane hospital by Superior Judge Sweeney. The man had been manifesting signs of insanity for several weeks, and on Monday morning a limney commission consisting of Drs. Looney and Finn examined the man and pronounced him a fit subject for treatment in the Phoenix institution.

A letter was received from the Arizona State Fair Commission with reference to the appointment of a County Fair Commissioner and the matter was taken under consideration.

A letter was received from Mr. Lamar Cobb asking that the board of supervisors recommend him for the position of receiver of the U. S. Land Office. Upon motion, the following resolution was duly passed and adopted, and the Clerk was instructed to advise Senators Ashurst and Smith of the action taken by the board:

WHEREAS there is a vacancy in the office of the receiver of the U. S. Land Office, and WHEREAS Mr. Lamar Cobb is an applicant for said position:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the board of supervisors of Yavapai County, Arizona endorse, and recommend the appointment of, Mr. Lamar Cobb as receiver of the U. S. Land Office.

A letter was received from Mr. LeRoy Anderson stating that residents of Pimcrest were in the habit of dumping garbage and refuse along the roads just outside the city limits of Prescott, and asked that some action be taken to stop this practice. The matter was referred to the County Board of Health.

A letter was received from the State Engineer with reference to the construction of the proposed direct route road between Prescott and Jerome and upon motion, same was ordered filed.

Upon motion, it was ordered that the county road outfit, now engaged in road work on the Hillside-Santa Maria road, be loaned to the Arizona Hillside Development Co. until further orders of the board.

Upon motion, duly seconded and carried, the Treasurer was authorized and directed to pay to Leopold Walloth, the sum of \$8.40, being the amount of the unclaimed estate of Nick Schlumberger, deceased; said Leopold Walloth having been appointed as administrator of this estate.
