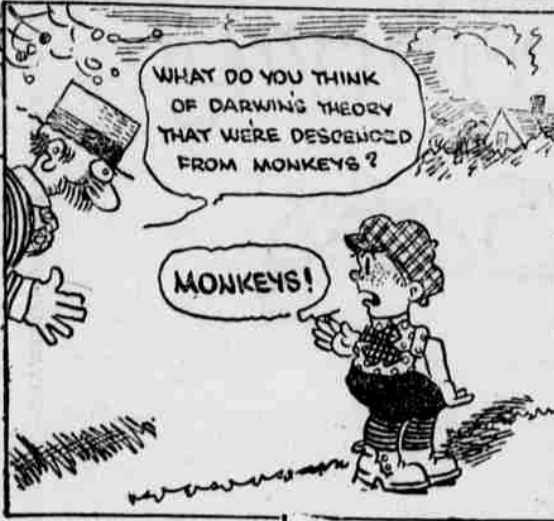


MICKIE, THE PRINTER'S DEVIL

Kernville, July 5th, 1922.—About 150 people turned out to see and participate in the games at Scott's Field yesterday. It was a fine, sociable, sporting crowd; and its enthusiastic participation in field events made the day a continuous series of pleasant thrills.

The Kernville nine lost again to the Fishermen in the most exciting baseball game of the season. There were notable changes in both line-ups—evidence that the fishing season is near at hand. Johnnie Dixon and Clarence Rinnon turned out with their bats, and Clyde Morris drifted down to join the rest of the Fishes and incidentally to show the millmen how the game is played.

OLSON LOSES TO TED THYE IN HARD GO

ALBANY, July 5.—The wrestling match last night between Ted Thye and Charlie Olson nearly ended in a fight between the sympathizers of the two men after Thye, in the ninth round, caught Olson off his guard and by tossing him on his head knocked him out. Cries of "Dirty," "Dirty" were heard throughout the arena. Oscar Butler who threw Vance on Tuesday night, was loud in his denunciation of Thye and offered to take Olson's place for the finish of the match.

Olson was game though, and after a short rest attempted to come back, but Thye, now thoroughly aroused, went at him like a tiger and in two minutes of the next round, clamped on a scissors and scored the only fall of the match. Olson was too weak to continue and the match was given to Thye. The fall which caused the trouble came in the ninth round when the men rolled off to mat and lay Kirk, the referee, told them to get back on.

Both men got to their feet and started for the middle of the mat, but just as they reached the middle Thye turned and seized Olson by the arm and lifted him completely off the mat and dropped him on his head, then by clamping on a scissors downed him. Olson was knocked out though by the fall on his head, and had to be carried off the mat, so the fall did not count. Oscar Butler offered to finish the match for Olson, and yelled at Thye "I'd like to see you try that on me." Thye smiled and answered, "Nothing, would please me more."

The match was to have been fifteen rounds of six minutes each, and up to the ninth when the fall occurred, the honors were about even, with the exception that Thye seemed to be the more aggressive, and was also plainly the more confident and experienced of the two.—Albany Herald.

A "Merryweather" Albertson took up the alab work for his team mates at this stage and had he not walked the first man that faced him he would have had the locals scoreless for the other four innings. The Toledo players were unable to do anything with his offerings, getting only two singles after he took the mound.

Newt Center, who played an excellent game at first base Sunday in the absence of Jack Hammond, batted his way into the lead of his teammates by getting three hits out of five times at bat. Newt has only played in three games and is certainly handling the big stick in excellent manner 15 times and has succeeded in getting 7 safe hits, three of them being doubles.

Louie Bain, old-trusty behind the bat, had a considerable handicap hanging over him in Sunday's game. In the game at Newport the Fourth he received a speedy one on his index finger that tore the flesh considerably, and this had not healed for Sunday's contest.

Bensell, first baseman for the Indians, had a perfect day at bat Sunday, only two times at bat counting against him and he has as many hits to his credit.
