GING OUT.

The last legislature enacted a law requiring the members of the County Court to vote six years. This is pretty tough. We imagine that faces will be seen to redder as the Justices sing out who they are for and on what side of a measure they stand. The effect of this law will be to put an end to magistrates in, estimating to half a dozen candidates that they will support them and vote for them. In our election for tax assessor at the next quarterly court, the Justices will have to sing out who they are for. Be brave, boys and face the music.

The net cash in the treasury of the United States on Nov. 1 was \$64 millions of dollars, or about a dollar apiece for every man, woman and child in the country. Including the net cash as just stated, the total cash in the treasury, as shown by the treasurer's latest account, is \$497,384,201.36, or about \$8 apiece for each inhabitant. With such an enormous accumulation, it is not surprising that the demand for a reduction of taxes should be on the increase. This situation, however, makes the prospect of securing a release of fractional currency all the more favorable. If the public will emphasize their desire for a return to this most convenient circulating medium it can doubtless be secured from the next Congress.

President J. K. Patterson of the Kentucky agricultural college at Lexington is a man imbued with good hard sense as well as literary and scientific abilities. In an address on the education required by the agricultural classes, he not only makes the familiar points that farmers must understand the principles of their business in order to compete in the markets of the world, but that he also "requires an education which shall make him maintain himself politically and socially, and maintaining himself thus, maintain the integrity of the institutions under which he lives, and the integrity and political well-being of his country. The intelligent educated farmer with well-developed brain and ready hand, with intelligence to know his rights and duties and how to maintain the one and discharge the other, is now, and will be still more in the future, the country's backbone."

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FROM TEAGUES.

Teagues Tenn. Dec. 15th 1887.

Mr. Editor: A great many of your readers are anxious to learn the history of the great "Agricultural Wheel." If you will allow me space in your paper, I will give you readers a brief history of the Wheel and its growth.

The first Wheel that was organized in the United States dates February the 15th, 1882, in a log school house, 8 miles South West of De Sark, in Prairie county, Arkansas, with seven members. The membership in 1883, numbered over 500; in 1884 5,000; in 1885, 10,000; in 1886, 50,000; and in 1887, 500,000. The membership in our own fair state numbers 63,000. We have 1023 Subordinate wheels in this state, besides 16 Colored wheels. The first wheel organized in Hardeman county was at Oak Grove Academy, located at Teague, Dec. 18, 1886, with 16 charter members by T. B. Ruff, of Madison county. January the 1st 1887, only 2 wheels had been organized in the county with a membership of about 30 members. The county wheel was organized at Glendale wheel, No 550, Feb. 12 1887. Ten subordinate wheels, with a membership of only 150 members were then in the county. The members went to work, carrying out the objects of the order, and from time to time we watched the growth of this organization and the interest that manifested by the Agricultural classes, and on the other side, we see combinations arising to impede its progress. We have met at various places with sessions of the county wheel, and success seems to make it progress to the best interest of the farmers. The Death of our first President; to wit, Bro. Hankins when hundreds witnessed the procession, cast aside all prejudices, that this organization was of short duration; and many who had not joined the order began to open their eyes to the growth of the wheel, and the babe of a few weeks was soon an infant very large. We had our Brother to rest and trusted him to the care of Him that doeth all things well. Our membership numbers at this writing 1270, and 89 subordinate wheels in this county. The best men in the farmers ranks are enlisted under the banner of Wheelcrism. Never has there been an association for bettering the condition of any class of people that can compare with the growth of this organization. We can now say that the mission has come to stay, and its certainty is without doubt. Our aims are equal rights and equal protection to all things "Equality and justice" are our watch words. Our aims are last the social improvement of our present condition by social intercourse; and the improvement of our farming in theory and practice.

2nd. Education, believing that the success of all occupations depends upon the enlightenment and elevation of its followers and that even the government itself cannot secure the prosperity of its citizens unless its people are thoroughly educated. Therefore one cause of the degeneracy of agriculture and the ruinous system that has impoverished our soil, is because as a general rule our farmers have neglected their education and home interest. We are for the protection of our interest, and let the legitimate business of other occupations run themselves, and we will run ours. We do not make war upon the legitimate industry of any others, we believe that the success of all other vocations rest on the success of the farmers. The commercial and manufacturing world reeds the produce of our farms, and when a general depression comes upon the farmer, they feel it to the same degree that the farmer does. Our organization teaches us that we should foster agriculture and the education of our people, and we should prepare ourselves for any business, and be capable of filling any position that should be thrust upon us. We need in the farmers ranks an improved idea in farming, and by all means a better system of education.

The State Wheel in session at Jackson the 1st inst adopted the cooperation plan of the National Alliance and Cooperative Union of America. We now have a state agent whose business it is to buy everything the order demands and the farmers use, and sell all the produce of the State for the farmers to the manufacturers. Thus dealing only with the manufacturer and leaving off the speculator. Many counties have elected their agents; and as soon as all meet, they will elect their agent who will work under the State agent. The wheel is

fast coming to the front. Various manufactures are coming to our assistance assuring us of their co-operation. Arrangements have been made with the largest plow company in the State for our plows, cheaper than ever anticipated. Also arrangements have been made with the manufacturers of different agricultural implements, by which great savings will be made. The wheelers in various counties are forming various associations for the promulgation of the order. Madison and Weakly have cotton warehouses. Gibson has a large subscription for the erection of a bank. Several counties in Middle Tennessee have a Peanut association. Henry and adjoining counties have made arrangements for the sale and storage of tobacco. Thus we are glad the farmers are throwing off the yoke of oppression and coming from under the coils of monopolistic combination and bringing themselves out of the old system of farming and ignorance. He had a large lumberer knife in his overcoat pocket, and while scuffling with another boy he fell, the handle of the knife struck the ground and his whole weight on it drove the blade up to the hilt in his side. The wound was pronounced three inches deep, but nothing definite was learned about the extent of the danger. It is thought that it may result fatally, as the knife ran upward.
