### THE LOUISIANA THEATRE.

WASHINGTON, April 19.—Gen. Emory telegraphed to the acting secretary of war this morning for additional instructions in regard to the use of troops in Louisiana at the present time, and especially upon the point whether he was to extend his military operations to the Kelllogg government in that State.

Acting Secretary Robinson has replied by directing Gen. Emory to protect the state government from violence and overthrow, and to use the military in aiding the United States officials in serving process. If the civil authorities of the state are powerless to administer law, and require assistance, the governor or legislature must call upon the president in the regular way. Gen. Emory is admonished that he must not interfere in local disputes between the two parties, unless by order of the president, after requisition by the governor for troops has been made.

A COLLISION IMMINENT.

Gen. Emory telegraphs that there is great excitement in New Orleans, and that a collision between the Kelllogg and McEnry factions is imminent.

AN ASSAULT IN NEW ORLEANS.

New Orleans, April 19.—Edward Booth received an invitation today upon being released from Parish prison where he had been incarcerated for twenty-four hours by Hawkins, for alleged contempt of the supreme court, in continuing business, refusing to pay taxes to Kelllogg Collector Hawkins having issued an injunction, restraining Booth from doing further business till the taxes were paid. A proclamation with a band of music escorted Mr. Booth from prison through the principal streets to his place of business. They were frequently cheered along the way.

WOUNDS RECEIVED IN EFFigy.

As the procession passed Court, Camp and Gravier streets, an effigy of Kelllogg was hung to a lamp post. The effigy was afterwards burned.
