A CURIOUS CORRESPONDENCE. For fourteen years, a Spanish savant has been studying the subject of the flow of sap in growing vegetation. As the result of his investigations, he puts forth the theory that there is the same ebb and flow in the circulation of sap as in the movement of tides, and that the action of the two corresponds perfeetly in point of time. In applying

this theory to practice, the experiment claims that trees felled at low tide resist the decaying influences of time and weather for a much greater time than do those cut during the flow of the tide. In prunning trees at the cbb of the tide and of the sap, an equal advantage is claimed. In applying the principle to orchards af the olive, orange, lime and other fruits, which had fallen into decay, it was found that, by pruning them while the tide was out, their health and fertility were restored. It is also asserted that trees so treated are rendered exempt from the ravages of insects and disease. 
