Correspondence of the St. Paul Press.

I left St. Cloud at six and a half o'clock yesterday morning in one of Messrs. Blakely & Carpenter's fine new coaches, drawn by four as fine, sleek horses as one could desire to ride behind. The morning was bright and For the Delicate Skin of Ladies and Child cool. The party inside and on top numbered sixteen, hailing from "Norse" land, "Faderland," Denmark, a small sprinkling of Yankees, and two young blooded English lords, who are en route for Fort Garry, to take a trip across the continent to Vancouver's \$10 Per Day Guaranteed Island. With this light load of humanity and baggage, we whirled along up the Sauk Valley at the rate of six miles an hour.

Not having passed over this road within four years, I was greatly surprised to note the great change and wonderful improvement that had taken place here. Then here and there a farm had been opened; now, almost the entire road from St. Cloud to Sauk Centre is fenced and immense fiel is of waving grain stretch away to the right and left. Good frame houses and barns are being built. Stores, good

hotels, churches and schoolhouses, evidence present and future prosperity.

At St. Joseph the German Catholics are erecting a very large stone church, one that would be an ornament in any of our large cities. The sisters have a school at this place.

At Melrose our old friend, Major Clark, formerly Chippewa Agent, has built a fine flouring mill and saw mill-He also has a store. With such a property and such a rich country about him, he should soon count his fortune by thousands.

Wheat, oats and barley look well and give promise of a good yield. Corn planted early is of good color and much more forward than any I have seen about St. Paul. I am told by parties from the North that the prospect of the coming crop is good; that fields above Alexandria are even better and will average a heavier yield than any we have seen below. I hear no complaint from potatoe bugs in this section of the valley. There were a few signs of them about St. Cloud. As I came up the valley I was touched with the industry of the people. All seemed to at work. Men, women, boys and girls work in the fields. One family seemed to have moved out into the potato patch. The mother was holding a cultivator or plow drawn by an ox, the chidren of larger size were hoeing and the smaller ones weeding, and the baby was lying between two rows with a big stone on his dress to keep him steady, All about within the reach of this youth the potato vines looked as though the bugs had been on them, and his face ST. CLOUD. gave signs that thus early he had eaten "his peck" fitting him tor his future field of labor and toil. This is the way to make good farmers. The stores are well built, and all seems prosperous. I have made many inquiries regard-


