#### FOREIGN.

LIVERPOOL, April 15.—Cotton closed firm at the following authorized quotations: Middling uplands, 12½; Orleans, 12½; sales, 15,000 bales; provisions are unchanged: corn, mixed Western, 43s 6d per quarter; Wheat, white California, 13s 10d@14s 3d per cental; Produce unchanged.

VIENNA, April 15.—Dispatches have been received here stating that Omar Pasha, with a ship of war and a large number of troops, had left Turkey for the purpose of joining the movement to suppress the insurrection in Crete.

LONDON, April 15.—Consols, 99½; Erie, 88½; Illinois Central, 78½; five-twenty, 74.

LONDON, April 15.—A mail steamer from Rio Janeiro has arrived. It is reported that the mediation of the United States was summarily rejected by Lopez.

FROM BALTIMORE.  
BALTIMORE, April 15.—The consolidation convention movement was carried by 1000 majority. It assembles at Annapolis on the second Monday in May.

FROM NEW ORLEANS.  
NEW ORLEANS, April 15.—Two more crevasses occurred at Bayou Lafourche Saturday, causing great distress in the parish of Lafourche.

The registration of voters commenced today. The majority of the applicants were negroes.

The Alabama Claims.—A New Proposition by Mr. Seward.

From the London Owl, March 29.

The American Government have not received with anything like cordiality the proposals of Lord Stanley for an arbitration of the Alabama claims. They even object to our first proposition, that the precise points to be submitted for decision to an arbitrator should be first definitely agreed to by the Americans and ourselves. Not only this, Mr. Seward actually makes a counter proposition, that the first question to be referred should be "Whether the English Government were justified in recognizing the rebel States as belligerents?"

This, of course, is a proposal so monstrous that it is impossible to entertain it. Although, however, on the surface the relations between the two governments are not apparently such as we could wish, nevertheless, it is certain that the Cabinet at Washington neither designs nor is in a position to assume an attitude of hostility. By leaving the pending questions to the wearing influence of time and the industrious sifting away of diplomats, we may be certain that ultimately the matters in discussion will be satisfactorily settled.

The Democratic members of the Pennsylvania Legislature caused a salute to be fired over the late Connecticut election from the same guns which thundered over the Radical victory last April, and the Radical members of the Legislature attribute their signal defeat to the effort of Congress to force negro suffrage upon the Northern States.
