Honors to Commodore M. F. Maury.

On the occasion of the installation of

Commodore Maury as a Professor in the

Virginia Military Institute, heretofore

allotted to General F. H. Smith, the

States navy when a mere boy, from

Tennessee, the State of his adoption, he

served in the navy with honorable dis-

When still a young man, he published a

valuable treatise on navigation, which

was used for many years as a text book

in the navy. His special qualifications

prompted the Government to place him

in charge of the National Observatory at

Washington; and it was in this position

that his first and highest distinctions

were won. Collating the work of the

ocean, he constructed those wonderful

charts and sailing directions which are

now used by every maritime nation, and

which have contributed so much to the

trade and commerce of the world.
