ORDINANCE

Whereas, Cartain parties are in the habit of sming skiffs and row-boats for use on the rivato children, who are entirely anable to man are same, thereby placing them in great danger of being drowned, several narrow escape having occurred during the past week therefore, be it.

Ordained. That it shall be unlawful for any person owning or using skiffs or row-boats, to hire or loan said boats to any children under thy wars of age for the on the river fronting the city.

That parties violating this ordinance shall be subject to arrest and fine by the Recorder in arms of not less than \$10 or more than \$10, to be collected as other fines.

That this ordinance take effect from and after its passage.
