Jonard, restorators adjoining MR, LUCK, was damaged to the amount of \$150. The part of the building occupied by Mr. GREIG was insured in the Commercial Insurance Company, for \$2,000. His family

occupied the upper rooms. His furniture and stock were insured for \$4,000 -- 2,500 with Nash & Marr, and \$1500 in the Tennessee Marine and Fire Insurance Company. The part of the building occupied by Mr. FLOWERS was insured in the Commercial Insurance Company for \$2,600, and that occupied by Mr. BARNES (owned Mr. WESSEL) in the Tennessee Marine and Fire Insurance for

Mr. Luck's loss is perhaps the heaviest of all, as he was not insured to the amount of a dollar. A good deal of his stock was saved, but most of it was sadly damaged.
