The 4th July Celebration.

Somewhat of the old-time ardor

characterized the celebration of the 4th of July by the people of our city. Artillery salutes were fired by the different squadrons of artillery under Colonel Henry Autl, Major Hudson Taylor and Captain I. D. Longfield, of the marines, at Scott's corner, in the city, and at the park by post-captain John W. Childs, of her royal majesty's navy. This last was a battery of rifle cannon.

At about 6 o'clock p. m. the children assembled at the German and English school house, were formed in line of procession by Major E. P. Byrne, marshal of the day, and headed by the Greenville brass band, marched to the park. Judge Davis Buckner then read the Declaration of Independence, and was followed by Hon. Frank Valliant in a short address to the children. He spoke of the advanced civilization which had banished the rod from the schoolhouse, and substituted a system of rewards for the diligent and obedient scholar. He spoke in terms of high compliment of the praiseworthy efforts of our Jewish citizens to establish a high school here, one that it properly sustained by the community would be amplified to meet the demands of the highest branches of education, and enable us to give our children a home education as thorough and perfect as could be obtained at any college in the land.

After the speech, the children were invited to a feast of ice cream and cake, which had been kindly provided by the Jewish Ladies Society, and which was dealt out with prodigal hand by Mrs. Baxter, Mrs. Hindsgauler and Mrs. Summerville.

In the deepening twilight, Prof. Thomas A. Burke, of the Royal Pyrotechnic College of Dublin illuminated the horizon with a magnificent display of fire-works and rockets.

The distribution of silverware came off at 11 o'clock at night. Two very fine sets were drawn by Mr. Jo. Wilcox, of Louisville; one by brother M. Gensburger, of our city; and the fourth, a wine set, was drawn by some person unknown to the committee.

Radical United No.

New Orleans, July 1.—The Radical nominating Convention adjourned until Wednesday, after making the following nominations: For Governor, S. E. Packard; Lt. Governor, U. L. Antoine; Superintendent Public Instruction, C. C. Brown.

A Congressional Seat.

When the Congressional Convention is held here to nominate a candidate for Congress from this District, we should see to it that the man selected will work for the interest of his District, and particularly for the welfare of the leading city of the State. He should be a man too, of vim and energy, whose claims will be real merit and not empty sound. Warren county, generally neglected, though always leading in political reform, and to whom the whole State is indebted for her present Democratic ascendancy, should not be ever passed aside by North Mississippi. —Herald.

An definite interpretation or application of this "bill" is beyond our power; though we suppose it to be well enough understood, it is Vicksburg, as the Tribune represents it. So far as we from observing to the best of our knowledge, extract, we hardly understand it. But what is meant by "Warren county being passed aside" in North Mississippi? Is not the same language used in this occasion as the previous ones? It is to consider the pre-eminence of the mid-state suggests from North Mississippi, Gen. Jas. K. Chalmers. Now, if this right can be accommodated in the suggestion, or judgment of a prospective elector, Congressmen, we are in full strength, we are not in position of any competitor, both from North, South, or middle Mississippi. The decision of the Convention is out only now.

But we do not recognize the idea that one locality more than another is entitled to name this candidate; or that he is to be preferred or rejected on account of his locality.

We warn our Vicksburg neighbors that if they have a favorite, as we infer they have, for this candidacy, that they err, we think in efforts to advance him by appeals against "North Mississippi;" or by harping upon the very questionable claim upon the State at large, of indebtedness to Vicksburg for "Democratic Ascendancy." Personal merit and capacity will be the rule by which the Convention will measure aspirants.

Congressional Convention.
