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There could be no more convincing evidence of Kipling's unique position among modern writers than the lack of surprise at the tremendous demand for his new book, "The Day's Work." For a week after it appeared the Doubleday & McClure Company were unable to supply the booksellers, although they were producing two thousand copies a day; and within two weeks of the publication in a fourth edition, making in all twenty-five thousand copies, had to be put to the press. Undoubtedly a portion of the book's popularity is attributable to the fact that it shows so many different sides of the author's genius, containing as it does stories of India, of machinery and of animals, besides two of Kipling's rare love stories: "William the Conqueror" and "The Brushwood Boy."
