fot ce Served on the Virginia Jockey Club

Notice Served on the Virginia Jocker Clubto That Effect—New Rules.

NEW YORK, April 4.—The meeting of
the stewards of the Jockey Club was held
yesterday afternoon at the Cumberland.

The secretary was instructed to notify
the Virginia Jockey Club that unless the
making of a foreign book be immediately discontinued their Bense would be revoked. A number of amendments to the
racing rules were approved and ordered
to be sumbitted to the members at the
next meeting, on April 11th.

Rule 1. section 2 (recognized race meeting).—A meeting held under a license
granted by the Jockey Club, or one held
in the United States or Canada, under

granted by the Jockey Club, or one held in the United States or Canada, under the sanction of any turf authority whose jurisdiction over racing of any nature is recognized by the Jockey Club which enforces the forfeit list of the Jockey Club, and such recognized associations, and which gives effect to sentences im-posed by these authorities upon persons guilty of fraudulent practices on the track.

Track.

Rule 38 amended as follows:

The office of the Jockey Club is designed to the regard office in the registry office is established for the purpose of identification of all race horses, whether foaled in the United States or in other countries, and the certification of their pedigree.

pedigree.
Horses foaled in the United States must be registered at the registry office by November 1st of the year in which they were foaled. Only horses are eligible for registration under this rule which have either five uncontaminated thoroughbred crosses, or which authentically trees through the artifacts presented to trace through to animals recorded in the first six volumes of the American stud-book, or in a recognized stud-book of another country, it is to be proved to the satisfaction of the stewards of the

of another country, it is to be proved to the satisfaction of the stewards of the Jockey Club that the failure of registration be unintentional or accidental, such registration may be permitted by the payment of a fine of \$10 for the registration, provided such application be made on or before December 1st.

Rule 21.—A mame must be claimed through the registry office of the Jockey Club for each and every horse on or before the first of March of its two-year, old year. No name that has been employed during the previous five years, either in the stud or on the turf, shall be duplicated, nor can a name be changed for any horse not registered as a foal. No horse will be allowed to start unless duly registered and named.

Rule 40.—An owner desiring to change the name of a horse must obtain special permission and pay the sum of \$100 on each change of name to the fine fund.

Rule 41.—A horse foaled out of the United States shall not be qualified to start in any race until the owner has filed in the registry office a certificate stating age, color, sex, distinguishing marks, if any, and the pedigree as recorded in the official stud-book of its native country, signed by the secretary or other public officer of a recognized racing clue, or by some approved migistrate or public officer of a recognized racing clue, or by some approved migistrate or public officer of the country in which the horse was foaled.
