

A YOUNG GIRL'S DEATH.

UNTIMELY END OF MISS EDITH JONES, OF MANCHESTER.

Revival Services Closed—Street and Finance Committees Meet To-Night—A Coming Wedding—Short Items of Interest.

A peculiarly sad death was that of Miss Edith Lucile Jones, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William T. Jones, of Swansboro, which occurred at the residence of her parents at 8:30 o'clock yesterday morning. She was only fifteen years of age, and while she had been complaining for some time, was not compelled to go to bed until Wednesday morning last. She was an earnest and regular member of Clifton-Street Baptist church and Sunday school, and had a large number of devoted friends.

Her funeral will be held at 4 o'clock this afternoon at Clifton-Street church, and the remains will be interred in Maury cemetery.

A meeting of the Street Committee will be held to-night to consider the street improvement matter, which they took up on Wednesday.

NO FOREIGN BOOKS ALLOWED.

Not Served on the Virginia Jockey Club to That Effect—New Rules.

NEW YORK, April 4.—The meeting of the stewards of the Jockey Club was held yesterday afternoon at the Cumberland.

The secretaries of the club, in conformity with the Virginia Jockey Club that unless the making of a foreign book be immediately discontinued their license would be revoked. A number of amendments to the racing rules were approved and ordered to be submitted to the members at the next meeting, on April 11th.

Rule 1, section 2 (recognized race meeting)—A meeting held under a license granted by the Jockey Club, or one held in the United States or Canada, under the sanction of any turf authority whose jurisdiction over racing of any nature is recognized by the Jockey Club, which enforces the forfeit list of the Jockey Club, and such recognized associations, and which gives effect to sentences imposed by these authorities upon persons guilty of fraudulent practices on the track.

Rule 3 amended as follows: The office of the Jockey Club is designed to be the office of the secretary of identification of all race horses, whether foaled in the United States or in other countries, and the certification of their pedigrees.

Horses foaled in the United States must be registered at the registry office by November 1st of the year in which they were foaled. Only horses are eligible for registration under this rule which have either been uncontaminated thoroughbred crosses, or which authentically trace through to animals recorded in the first six volumes of the American stud-book, or in a recognized stud-book of another country, to be determined by the satisfaction of the stewards of the Jockey Club that the failure of registration be unintentional or accidental, such registration may be permitted by the payment of a fee of \$10 for the registration, provided such application be made on or before December 1st.

Rule 2.—A name must be claimed through the registry office of the Jockey Club for each and every horse owned or held before the first of March of its two-year-old year. No name that has been employed during the previous five years, either in the stud or on the turf, shall be complicated, nor can a name be changed for any horse not registered as a foal. No horse will be allowed to start unless duly registered and named.

Rule 4.—An owner desiring to change the name of a horse must obtain special permission and pay the sum of \$100 on each change of name to the fine fund.

Rule 4.—A horse foaled out of the United States shall not be qualified to start in any race until the owner has filed in the registry office a certificate stating age, color, sex, distinguishing marks, if any, and the pedigree as recorded in the stud or on the turf, of its native country, signed by the secretary or other public officer of a recognized racing club, or by some approved magistrate or public officer of the country in which the horse was foaled.

Official notice was also received that Pinhook Driving Club's meet would begin on June 3d, and continue for six days.

The Virginia Jockey Club was ordered to be notified that it must appoint three stewards.
