TWO MEN KILLED IN LYNCHBURG BY ELECTRIC CHARGED WIRES.

A Panic in a Livery Stable Where Death Seemed to Lurk in Every Stall. The City Enjoined.

LYNCHBURG, VA., May 21,-Special. I'wo more victims were added leaths in Lynchburg from electricity at an early hour this morning. The men were Edmund Woodson and

George Smith (colored), and the stable of the Lynchburg Livery Company, on Commerce street, was the scene of the fear-Electricity had been playing mad pranks

during the early hours of the night, and about 3:30 o'clock one of the wires in about 3:30 o'clock one of the wires in the stable blazed up. Edmund Woodson, who was employed by Conley, Poliard & Co., as a driver, went into a stall in the rear with a bucket of water, and, it is supposed, touched some bale wire which was shocked to death. George Smith, an old man employed as night watchman witnessed the death of Woodson, and aroused the other stable hands. The wites above were then blazing, and he went up stairs to leek after the fire. He was heard to cry out several times, and he, too, was killed.

The stable hands were in a panic when Officer Tanner arrived. He sent for n playsium, the fire aiam was turised in and a boy dispatched on horseback for Mr. J. W. McKinney, the manager of the stables.
