Democratic Convention

The National Democratic Convention is called to meet in Baltimore on July 9th, 1872. The Committee met on the 8th at the residence of August Belmont in New York City.

Our Position.

The law in regard to bounties does not, as stated in some of our exchanges, include soldiers who enlisted for three months. Under the law the accounting officers have decided as follows: All soldiers who enlisted for three years, between May 1 and July 22, 1861, and were mustered for three years prior to August 6, 1861, and were honorably discharged, are entitled, if they have not received the same for such service, to \$100 bounty.

New Law Relating to Fire Companies.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Ohio, That any person who is, or may hereafter become, an acting member of any fire-engine, hook and ladder or hose company, for the extinguishment of fire, or the protection of property against fire, now existing, and under the control of any city or incorporated village of this State, or of any such company as may hereafter be organized under and subject to the authorities or any city or village as aforesaid, shall, during the time he shall continue an acting member of such company, be exempt from the performance of military duty in time of peace, and from the performance of labor upon highways.

Sec. 2. The act entitled "An act to encourage the organization of fire companies," passed May 11, 1861, (S. & S., 374) is hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect from its passage.

Passed March 26, 1872.
