## Facts for the Patrons of Husbandry to Consider.

While we all admit that legislation is necessary concerning railroad freights, we must not lose sight of the fact that behind this there is a monster that is more oppressive than the railroad, and one that has in a great measure helped the rail road to place its iron heel on the necks of the producers. Now to show him how he is plundered by this tariff, we present the following for him to look at, and then he will begin to realize how he is defrauded, and believe that in order to receive protection he must cut loose from the old political parties, and put men of his own class into power to legislate for him:

On every overcoat costing... On every sust of clothec..... On every six shirts corting On socks and underwear..... On two pair of blankets......... On shawl for wife..... On woman's shoes... ne articles for rest of family....... 100

Thus you can see that out of over \$197, expended for the necessary clothing for your family you pay \$61,50 of a tax, not to the government, but to the manufacturing monopolies, pensioned by law upon the Farmers, and that law made by the present Radical party in power! Thus in the purchase of a little bill of goods by our farmers to the amount of \$197,00 they pay tithes to the manufacturers of \$61,50; or, to make it more plain, they have to sell 214 bushels of twenty five cent corn to raise money to pay this Republican tax! If this money went into the treasury, it would not work for five cents a day. such a hardship; but it does not, and no sound man will for a moment contend that it does.

The above table does not cover all the items on which the fariners are forced to pay tariff on. He has to pay an average tax of 50 per cent. on every implement of iron that he uses; on his horse shoes, on his wagon tires and his plows; on every screw, bolt, mail, or rod of fron; he pays the tax on his tin and copper-ware; on his cook-stove and pipe; on his glass and crockery ware; on his cutlery; on his carpet, and on his salt, lumber, vinegar and mustard, on nearly all that he cats, drinks and wears, except what he raises himself; and about fifty cents on every dollar he expends is paid over as a special bounty to monopolies who have obtained from Congress the special privilege of taking other people's property and earnings without consideration. Here is a practical grievance that can be remedied at the ballot-box by the farmers, and only by them. Then let the Preble county farmers discuss this with other grievances; let them make a charge upon the whole matter at lon in Eaton. once through the ballot. Let all who are anxious for relief unite upon this question and press forward until the enemy are driven from their stronghold by honest, upright legislators, men from among you and of you, who know your wants and who you can rely upon for them. in page
