Will be Voted by Senate Today,
According to Program of
Finance Committee.

Washington, Sept. 5—A thirty-one per cent tax on war profits will be voted by senate today. This is the program of the finance committee, which for many days has been battling the vigorous demands of a score of senators, led by Senators Johnson and Borah, for a heavier levy on the profits of war. The committee amend ment will raise \$1,060,000,000, practically double the sum the committee amend ment will raise \$1,060,000,000, practically double the sum the committee to get from war profits.

"We have falled to get what we wanted out of this," Senator Johnson, California, said today. "But we have forced what amounts to victory. The committee has been compelled to get from war profits."

Under the committee plans war profits are established as the difference between 1917 income of a corporation and the average peace profits computed from two of the three years before 1914, plus from six to the per cent on the invested capital. It amounts to a general tax upon all profits.
