TRENTON, May 13.—Regulation having failed, the only way to break up the big trusts is for the public to acquire and operate the railroads of the country, giving equal facili-ties to every shipper and in the case of the coal trust, we must take the price of a few battleships and buy a quantity of the unused land conaining coal, and lease it upon mod taining coal, and lease it upon moderate royalties to competitors of the trust, with a provision for forfeiture in case fo non-user. Such was the statement of George L. Record, candidate against Senator Joseph Frelinghuysen in the Republican primaries, speaking before the New Jersey Leasue of Women Voters here last night.

"Another thing to do," declared Mr. Record. "is to drive these millionaires out of the United States Senate and elect men who are prepared to vote to destroy these trusts by taking away their privileges."

"Mr. Record outlined the Newberry case as follows:

"Newberry was an obscure millionaire living in New York. He had no qualifications for the senate. He was sentenced to prison for spending over \$200,000 to procure his nomination and election in Michigan. He perjured himself by filing an affidavit that no money whatever was spent with his knowledge or consent. His manager on the stand testified and admitted that Newberry knew about the expenditures and that most of the money sectually came from Newberry's own bank account."
