Kentucky Militia to Join With Four
Other States.

Washington.—The militia division of
the War Department, in arranging for
Spring maneuvers for various State
militia, has ordered that the militia of
Kentucky, Alabama, Tennessee and
Mississippi, constituting the Tenth
division, will meet at some central point
for maneuvers, the point to be selected
by Gen. Evans, in charge of the di-
vision.

PROBABLE MURDER

Emanuel Sharp Former Maysville Man
Found Dead On B. & O. S. W.
Tracks at Cincinnati—Coroner
Investigating.

(Sunday's Enquirer.)
Developments at the inquest in the
case of Emanuel Sharp, a B. & O. S. W.
Railway brakeman, who was found dy-
ing between the tracks near State ave-
nue last Wednesday, caused Coroner
Foertmeyer to order a thorough investi-
gation of the case. Testimony was
given by a relative of the dead man
which led the Coroner to believe that
it was possible that Sharp had met with
foul play. A post-mortem examination,
which was made yesterday by Dr. Oliver
F. Coe, showed that Sharp's death was
due to a subdural hemorrhage and a
fracture of the cervical vertebrae. It
is believed that the subdural hemor-
rhage was not caused in an accident.
The Coroner took charge of Sharp's
body yesterday as it was being placed
on board a C. and O. Railway train for
shipment to Maysville, Ky. It was or-
dered removed from the depot to the
County Morgue, where the post-mortem
examination was made by Dr. Coe. An
anonymous letter received by a relative
in which it was alleged that a fellow
workman killed Sharp and placed his
body in front of a train, had been turn-
ed over to the police Friday by the fam-
ily, but the Coroner had not been in-
formed of the letter.

Carey R. Sharp, of 2603 Eastern ave-
nue, is a brother of the dead man. He
told of receiving the mysterious letter
which named the man the writer said
killed his brother. Coroner Foertmeyer
then secured possession of the body and
asked the city detectives to assist him
in his investigation.

W. G. Farquhar, who found the body
testified that it was lying between the
east-bound and the west-bound tracks
about 300 feet east of State avenue. His
hat was found about eight feet north of
this point, and his lantern four feet
east of the place where his hat was
found. The members of the train crew
will be questioned by Coroner Foert-
meyer on Monday.

As soon as Dr. Coe completed his
post-mortem examination of the body
it was shipped to Maysville, where it
will be buried today.

Deceased was buried Sunday in the
Maysville Cemetery.
Mr. Julius Sharp, his brother is em-
ployed in the Ohio Valley Pulp Works.

JOHN E. FITZGERALD

City Auditor of Lexington Passes Away
After Heart Illness Since Last
September.

(Sunday's Lexington Herald.)
After an illness since last September,
for the last five weeks of which he was
forced to remain away from his duties,
City Auditor John E. Fitzgerald, died
Saturday night at 9 o'clock, at his home
431 North Limestone. Death was due
to angina pectoris.

Mr. Fitzgerald was 45 years of age,
was born in Mason County and never
married. He was the son of Johanna
C. and John C. Fitzgerald. The father
died some years ago. His mother is
among those who survive him.

He is survived by a brother, W. G.
Fitzgerald, secretary of the Central
Construction Company, and three sisters
Misses Margaret, Katherine and
Josephine Fitzgerald, all of this city.

Mr. Fitzgerald was a member of the
Y. M. I. Lodge and also of the Knights
of Columbus. He was an expert ac-
countant and considered one of the best
in the city.
