A Pottery Tree.

The pottery tree of Ezra is one of the curiosities of Brazil. The stem does not exceed a foot in diameter and grows to the height of one hundred feet. But its greatest peculiarity consists in the nature of its wood and bark, which contain so much silica that they are used for the manufacture of earthenware vessels. The bark contains more silica than the wood; and in preparing it for the potter's use, it is first burnt, and the residuum is pulverized and mixed with clay, a similar quantity of each ingredient producing a superior ware. The fresh bark cuts like soft sandstone, and when dried is difficult to break.

The Highest Lake in the United States.

Dr. Harkness has discovered, in Fresno county, California, a body of water, probably the most elevated in the United States, the barometer registering a height of 7,390 feet above the sea level.

The lake is of triangular shape, having its longest diameter about one mile and three quarters in length. The water during last August was intensely cold and of a deep blue color. The outlet is into Warner Valley, over a declivity of some 2,000 feet. The California Academy of Sciences has named the lake, after its discovery, Lake Harkness.
