Next you find yourself at a real husking-bee at the Pettengill farmyard. You will hold your sides in laughter at the grotesque dancing of Abner Stiles and Mrs. Crowley.

When you recover, you find that you are in the midst of a good old-fashioned snow-storm, but you shiver for only a minute or two, for the interior of the comfortable Pettengill homestead is opened to your gaze. Everybody eats supper all the tangled love affairs are straightened out and everybody is supremely happy. You are happy too, for the joys and sorrows of those quaint people have been your own. You go away with the singing of the doxology lingering in your ears, and feeling that you have tasted a piece of genuine rural atmosphere.
