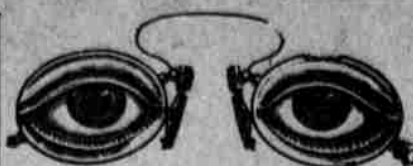
Notice is hereby given that a petition will be presented to the Commissioners of Highland county, Ohio, at their session to be held Monday, May 11th, 1914, praying for the appointment of Road Commissioners to lay out and establish a FREE TURNPIKE ROAD along the following line, to-wit: Beginning—

At a point in the North Line the Straight-out and Buford free turnpike, where a certain county road intersects said free turnpike, near the residence of P. Q. Fenner; thence with said county road in a northerly direction, about 200 rods to where said county road intersects the Old State Road from Danville to Buford east of the school house in District No. 3, Clay township, in Highland county, Ohio; thence with said State Road in a westerly direction about 50 rods to a culvert which is built across said State Road at a point where the Salem and Clay township road intersects said State Road, near the residence of Henry Eversard; a distance of about seven eighths of a mile (7-8) and being located in Whiteoak and Clay townships, Highland county, Ohio.

Said free turnpike road to be constructed under the provisions of the General Code of Ohio, relating to the construction of "One Mile Assessment Pikes" as contained in Chapter 8 of Title 4 of Part Second of said General Code of Ohio and the acts amendatory thereto.

And for the purpose of constructing Free Turnpike Road they will ask for the levy of an extra tax of ten (10) mills on the dollar for the period of 15 years, if not paid for sooner, upon all the lands and taxable personal property within the limits of the said proposed Free Turnpike Road, (under the one mile assessment pike law.) Sections 7202 to 7281 General Code of Ohio and the acts amendatory thereto.

## Notice!

All persons having any of my milk bottles in their possession will please return them to me or leave them for me at a place convenient for me to get them, at once, calling my attention to the place where I can get them.

Also please desist from the taking or using of them for any purpose hereafter.

I desire to call the attention of all such persons to Section 13169 of the General Code of Ohio as amended on the 5th day of May 1913 which reads as follows:

"Whoever fills or re fills with milk, cream or other milk product, a glass jar or bottle having the name of a person, firm, corporation or association blown therein, with intent to sell such milk, cream or other milk product, shall be fined not more than one hundred dollars. This section shall not apply to a person, firm or corporation whose name is blown in such glass jar or bottle, or to a member of an association the name of which association is blown in such glass jar or bottle, or any authorized agent or employee of such person, firm, corporation or member of such association, or to the owner of such glass jar or bottles, or to any person authorized by the owner thereof to use said glass jar or bottle."
