## THIRD FIRE AT **POWDER WORKS**

Barrel House at Mt. Union Explosives Plant Destroyed Last Night

Mt. Union, Pa., Jan. 17. - The third fire within seven days is causing considerable discussion among citizens of town. The third fire occurred last night when the "Screen Barrel" house at the Aetna Explosives plant burned, probably necessitating a number of \$150,000 Arcade Building to men being out of employment for some time. This was the only build-ing of its kind at the powder plant and was at the head of the "Powder

The cause given by the authorities is that it was started by a spark from a steel file.

Friday night there was a fire and the cause given for it was a defective belt and the first fire, which caused probably \$100,000 damage, by letting the pipes in the Recovery building be-come too hot.

Some people seem to take a skeptical view because of the fact that the fires have occurred within one week's time and all along the "Powder Line" where a fire would cause most damage and throw most men out of employment.

The authorities claim the fires are all accidental, but they are taking every precaution as to guards and careless workmen.
