TURNER ANNOUNCES PLANS FOR THE BIG POTLATCH FESTIVAL

Potlatch Button Will Be One of the Most Important Features

DECIDE TO HAVE TWO VOTING CONTESTS

Most Popular Church or Charity Organization and Labor Body Will Be Selected by Ballot—Prize of \$120 to the Winners

Long and high drifted the smoke from the council chambers of the Chamber of Commerce yesterday while the final details on some of the plans for the potlatch festival to be held April 24 and 25 were being worked out by Big Chief Oscar Turner and his medicine men.

POTLATCH BUTTON IMPORTANT

The potlatch button is to be one of the most important features of the festival. The button will be on hand as soon as it can be made and will carry a likeness of an Indian chief or some similar Indian scenery.

The big chief further stated that the button will carry a coupon which will entitle the holder to vote in a great election which is to be somewhat on the following manner: Tepees will be erected on the prominent downtown street corners and boys and girls in Indian costume will preside over them.

PRIZES FOR WINNERS

The two winning organizations in this election will be awarded two fine wampum belts, to which all the tribes of the city have agreed and will assist in making. These belts, one to go to each of the winners, will be lined with 12 golden eagles of the Great White Feather, making \$120 for each belt and \$240 for the two.

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MUSIC FESTIVAL TO BE HELD AT BIJOU THEATRE
