It will be seen by this array of talent, that experience, zeal and energy are brought to bear in this ardnous enterprise. They have both fame and fortune at stake-receiving as they do no fixed salaries from the University. Let our citizens give them a hearty co-operation.

The Law Department is well filled. The mention of two such names as Francis B. Fogo and WILLIAM F. COOPER carries with it the prestige of brilliant success for the new department. Mr. F. is identified with the history of the bar of Tennessee; to a profound knowledge of the law, he unites great general learning. If the younger members of the profession had been called upon to select one from their number to fill a place in the school, Mr. Coorer would have been their choice. Few men of his age have earned so enviable a reputation for legal knowledge and knowledge of general science. We congratulate the Trustees on getting two such men to fill the chairs assigned them.

The Medical Department completes the list. It is enough to say of it, that by the united and energetic labors of a hard-working Faculty, it has become the fifth or sixth school in the Union-having in three years made greater progress than ever did any similar enterprise.

The University in its three departments is calculated to wield a wide influence, and if our citizens will foster it. Nashville will become the intellectual centre of the South
