River News.

The Ashland passed up on Tuesday at 1:30 p. m., and the local packet, Jewel, arrived at Grand Ecote at 12 p. m., on Tuesday night, with a fine freight.

Capt. Flood who has charge of the tug boats engaged in dredging the mouth of Red river, reports eight feet of water in the channel. Red river is in good boating order with a declining tendency.

Rents.

The town of Natchitoches has been without a vacant residence for more than two years past, and in consequence there will be, this winter, a material advance in rents. Some of our house owners have already been offered as much as double the amount of rent now received by them for eligible houses, and they have determined to accept the proffer. This speaks well for the business improvement of this section.

Cotton Pickers and Prices.

Nothing is wanting to show the scarcity of labor in this country more than the prices paid cotton pickers. Fifty-five cents per hundred is the offer now being made, or \$17 per bale to which we will add the price of bagging, ties and ginning, say \$4, or a total of \$21 per bale to be added to the price of production from which farmers can sum their profits. In our opinion the production per hand must be great to stand such an outlay for putting in market.

Artificial Flowers.

We were shown a specimen bouquet of those flowers manufactured by our friend, Richard Brazzil, which are really, artistic. Dick was for years a Texas Ranger, and there, we suppose, he studied his art. He now proposes to instruct others in their manufacture in either paper, zephir or silk, at the low price of from five to ten dollars, and parties furnishing the material will have the privilege of retaining their work. By this, they will be remunerated for the entire outlay, besides learning the art. He is associated with Mr. Daley in the carpentering and undertaking business, and their advertisement will be noted in another column.

Justice's Court.

Justice Levy's court has been the scene of renewed activity this week. Jim Morgan was the first of the raiders interviewed by the court. Jim pitched into Albert Thompson with a big pistol, and it being proven that Jim's assault was dangerous and his intent murderous, he was sent before the District Court. Jim was also charged with carrying concealed weapons and found guilty—result for Jim, the District Court. Aaron Davis trespassed upon the estate of Dr. Carroll, known as the Lake Jerico plantation, and was found guilty. Aaron went before the District Court also.

A trial at Justice Levy's Court draws a large crowd, and the proceedings are not without interest.

In the company of an intelligent gentleman, who has been in the habit for years of spending his summers at Northern watering places, we visited Spanish Fort and the West End, and our friend assured us that the beauty of its attractions not only equaled, but surpassed, those of Cony Island and other places of fashionable resort which he had visited. Nor will they stop at this. They design connecting the entire Lake Shore by rail, so that a visitor can travel from one point to the other, and enjoy every variety of amusement, as well as good bathing, at a trifling cost. By this means thousands upon thousands that have been annually spent at Northern watering places will remain at home.

Can not we arouse our fellow-citizens to some such improvement? The enterprise will pay in the future.

By this means our town will be made attractive and enjoyable. Our brass band should also be helped and encouraged. We have entered upon a political campaign, in which the interest of every freeman is at stake. Let us have good music, but not at the expense of the hard-working gentlemen who give their talent and services gratis.

In such improvements our prosperity lies. Through them the money that is spent abroad will remain at home. We admonish you, then, fellow-citizens.

Weaver, be now changed again to begin at the fork of the Campie, Sparta and Vernon road, running in a North East corner, by the residence of Mrs. Chestnut, and terminating at the Parish line near the residence of Mrs. Strad, and that Jno. Chestnut be appointed overseer on said road No. 5, and he is hereby instructed to carry out the provisions of said petition. Adopted.

By Mr. Breazeale, That Noah Cloud be appointed road overseer of Road No. 8, 4th District. Adopted.

By Mr. Hathorn, Petition of citizens Ward No. 2, allowing Noah Cloud Ferry privileges on Black Lake, at Slum and Deney Ferry, until the first of January, 1882, provided he comply with the terms and specifications set forth in the petition this day filed in the office of the Clerk of this Hon. Body. In default of which he shall forfeit and pay to the Parish the sum of Twenty-Five Dollars. Adopted.

By Mr. Hathorn, Petition of citizens of Ward Two, asking for a bridge to be built across the Bayou Saline at the Clifton Bridge Crossing, and that their pro rata of the Bridge Fund of Ward Two, be allowed them for this purpose, whenever funds are in the Treasury. Adopted.

By Mr. Hathorn, That Harrison Alford and Thos. Castro be placed on the Parapher List. Adopted.

By Mr. Dowden, That the Ordinance relating to Road Apportioners be re-enacted to take effect from and after the 1st of January, 1881, as follows:

Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of Natchitoches, That the regular January Session of each year, three householders in each ward of the Parish, subject to road duty, whose duty it shall be to act as Road Apportioners for the term of one year and whose jurisdiction as such shall be limited to the Ward for which they are appointed, and of which they must be residents.

Sec. 2. Be it further Ordained, &c., That said Road Apportioners shall, within twenty days after the receipt of their appointment of their Wards, and liable to work on public roads, to the several overseers of their respective districts, and to furnish lists to said Overseers of all persons liable to work the roads of which they are overseers; and such persons shall be subject to the orders and directions of said overseers, and no other persons shall be liable to road service except those whose names appear on said lists. The said lists on furnished shall be attested by a majority of the said Apportioners.

Sec. 3. Be it further Ordained, &c., That should the Police Jury fail or neglect to appoint the Road Apportioners as required by this Ordinance Sec. One, the apportioners appointed for the year preceding shall hold their offices till their successors are appointed and duly notified of their appointment. And any Apportioner duly appointed and notified, refusing to act as such, or neglecting to discharge any of the duties prescribed in the preceding Section, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction, be subject to a fine not to exceed Twenty-five Dollars, or imprisonment not to exceed Twenty days, at the discretion of the Court.

Mr. Burkett, voting Nay.
