A number of Mexicans were buried in the ruins; but the balance resisted the French all night, fighting furiously. On the morning the 25 th both parties were rei forced, and continued the fight with the greatest dut-rmination and ferocits the Mexicans, at its close, holding zhefrorigina position During the contest the Vreach exploded another mine in the Sanala Jesu, and anoth er fight ensued there, lasting seyen hours, the Mexkeans remsining masters of the fieta, and capturing one hundred and thirty prisoners
