PETERSBURG, VA., May 1.-(Special.) Mr. George S. Bernard, referee in bankruptcy, heard argument in an interesting case to-day, involving the validity of a deed of trust.

It appears that Mr. J. A. Thorpe, of Waverly, who was declared a bankrupt several months ago, gave a deed of trust conveying to the John L. Roper Lumber Company, of Norfolk, his saw-mill, mules, horses, and other personal property.

This deed was given on the 17th of May, 1899, and was not recorded until January 29, 1902-two weeks after Thorpe had been declared a bankrupt.

It was argued by counsel for the trustee of the creditors of Mr. Thorpe, that the deed in question is invalid for several reasons, but chiefly so because of the failure of the Roper Lumber Company to record the deed of trust, and in that way give notice that the deed was in their






