NEW YORK, March 13.—Since the inauguration of President Taft the average price of twenty active railroad stocks, usually taken for statistical purposes, has swung backward and forward steadily and monotonously as the pendulum of a clock.

On the first day of the pendulum movement—March 1—market price declined a bit more than half point. With that exception neither advance nor decline has been as much as half a point, and the sequence to-day left the average at the close at approximately the same price as at the close on March 4.

In these nine trading days the market has been steady as a clock, but there have been occasional alarms, such as the audacious rumor of an Erie Revision, and stray reports of tariff revision, and of the steel and copper trades.

To-day the market was noiseless, like one of the tickless French clocks silently recording the passage of weary hours. There was neither good or bad report, no rumor, gossip or scandal to lend spice to the trading. This trading was entirely professional, but without the loose talk which ordinarily accompanies a professional market.

The statement confirmed the prediction that the \$8,000,000 gold sent abroad in the course of the week could be easily spared. Notwithstanding the exportation of the coin, there was an increase of \$1,875,000 in the surplus over requirements, according to the statement of averages.
