North Carolina was well represented at the Centennial in New York city this week.

The Wilmington Messenger says that the Democratic prospects for 1888 were not as bright four years ago as they are now for 1892.

Colored people from all parts of the State met at Raleigh on Friday, April 26th, and organized the North Carolina Emigration Association. About 3,000 delegates were present, and nearly every County in the State was represented.

The party of sanitarians and physicians who recently visited Florida report that the sanitary condition of the State is excellent, that there is but little fever of any kind, that there will be no yellow fever epidemic, and that the disease will be confined to sporadic cases, like that at Sanford recently. All of this is good news.

Mr. J. I. McRee, who has been connected with the Raleigh News and Observer for a number of years, has resigned his position to assume work elsewhere, and Mr. C. T. Grandy, of Camden county, has been temporarily engaged to fill the vacancy. Mr. Grandy is a graduate of the University of the State and has had considerable experience in Florida and Washington as a newspaper man.

James F. NORTH CAROLINA NEWS.

The North Carolina State Dental Association will meet in Greensboro, June 25th.

Mr. J. C. Birdsong has been re-elected State Librarian. The library now contains 60,000 volumes.

Archibald Brady has been appointed postmaster at Charlotte, vice John A. Young, deceased.

Raleigh Signal: We are glad to be informed that some of our farmers are planting sorghum with the intention of making their syrup at home.

Raleigh Evening Visitor: The 15th of May has been selected as the time for our next cattle show, and we hope to see such an exhibition as will be a source of pride to our people. We sincerely hope there will be a large turnout of people and that the number of cattle may far exceed any that has preceded it. The improvement in stock in this section of the State, during the past few years, has been wonderful, but still there is room for further development.

Shelby Aurora: Judge Walter Clark is an able and fearless judge who pushes business. He is an expert judge of human nature as well as of law. Law breakers shun him because he imposes heavy penalties. He fined one adulterer \$250 and imprisonment one month; another adulterer \$150 and six months in jail; one man for a bloody affray, \$200; one man for treating whisky at an election, \$100. His total fines will amount to \$980, and all fines well secured for he took no straw bonds.

In a personal letter received by a gentleman in Charlotte from Senator Vance, the Senator says, in reply to a question about his sight: "The statement which has been going the round, that my remaining eye is in danger, I am happy to assure you, is unfounded. So far as I can judge, its sight has been strengthened by the removal of the other. I suppose that the care which I have taken to put no strain upon it that could be avoided, gave rise to the rumor. If I can get a complete rest until next December, I have every reason to believe that I shall be completely restored in bodily health."

Asheville Citizen: Two countrymen were in the city yesterday with a snake that had two heads where one only should have been. In those two heads were two perfectly developed tongues which darted forth with lightning rapidity every moment or two. The reptile was about twelve inches in length, and "was of that species known as "black snake." The countrymen captured it near Asheville, and refused to sell it at any price. Quite a number of people in the city saw the freak during the day and each declared that he had never seen or heard of such a thing before. The reptile will be sent to a noted museum North in a few days, and we learn that a handsome amount only will bring about a change in its ownership. Just think of double-headed snakes in a man's boots; ugly!
