The Most Horrible Railroad Disaster Ever Known in this

State.

The mail train going towards Asheville was hurled from the top turned to Hillsboro from Mt. Airy of Bostian's bridge over Third creek, a distance of about 70 feet, 2 miles west of Statesville at 2 o'clock on Thursday morning, Angust 27th. The engineer, fireman, haggage mas ter, and 19 others were killed or drowned in the water.

Among the killed was Mrs. F. II White, of Memphis. Tenn, a reia tive of Dr. Wm. S. Strudwick, of Hillsboro. at Morristown, Tenn. Twenty-six persons were wound ed, and it is thought that several of them will die. Two persons are reported missing. There were just fifty persons on the train, and only two escaped without injury. Col Bennehan Cameron and State Auditor Sanderlin went down with the wrecked train. Col. Cameron had a very narrow escape from drowning, and saved Auditor Sanderlin from a watery grave. From all accounts, Col. Cameron acted the part of a hero. He saved the lives of several.






