

Congress meets next Monday.

The Legislature will convene in Raleigh on Wednesday, January 4, and remain in session for sixty days.

Pension Commissioner Raum's annual report will show that the pension appropriations last year were \$144,000,000 which was \$18,000,000 too little, and that for next year \$180,000,000 will be asked for.

The State Returning Board met in Raleigh on December 1st, to canvass the returns of the recent election. The Board is composed of the Governor, Secretary of State, Attorney General, and Senators Jas. H. Pate, Democrat, of Johnston, and W. D. Henderson, (colored) Republican, of Vance, who were appointed by the Governor under authority vested in him.

At a conference held in Raleigh last Saturday it was decided that the \$25,000 appropriated by the last Legislature for the North Carolina exhibit out of the direct tax fund was available. This relieves all further trouble and the work of making the exhibit at the World's Fair will be actively pushed. This is most fortunate for the State. Over a year ago it was decided that the amount appropriated would not be available.

Our Old Soldiers.

 We are informed by Mr. Will C. Stronach who has in charge the Soldiers' Home in this city, that the institution at present does not by any means meet the requirements. There are now nearly sixty inmates and ten applications on file. The rooms are all filled and no more inmates can be accepted or provided for with anything like comfort. Since the opening of the Home there have been eighty five inmates six of whom have died. They represented nearly all sections of North Carolina. Mr. Stronach expects that, in the course of another year, there will be applications for at least one hundred and room should be provided for them. It is hoped therefore that one of the first appropriations made by the General Assembly will be in this direction. There should be nothing like stint in the matter. These old veterans will soon be called home and the State owes it to them, as a duty, to see that their declining years are made as comfortable as possible.

A Novel Device for Getting Rid of the Negro Vote in Alabama.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Nov. 22.—A bill was introduced in the Legislature to day, which is bound to attract a great deal of attention throughout the country. It becomes a law it will practically do away with the negro vote in Alabama. The bill was introduced by Representative Brewer, of Lowndes county, who has been in the Legislature fourteen years and State Auditor four years. He is looked upon as the financial authority of the State and has written a history of Alabama, as well as two excellent novels. The bill provides that "all persons whose State and county taxes, as assessed, do not amount to \$5.00, shall not be required to pay the same if it be shown that such person failed to vote at the August and November elections of the previous year." At the lowest calculation, 50 per cent of the negro voters would take advantage of the opportunity of saving \$5.00. The negro vote of last election was 132,000 out of a total of 500,000. It can be seen that the effect of the bill will be widespread. Those most competent to judge think it will do away with the trouble which so vexes the white people. The bill was a surprise. Few members expected anything of the kind. It was the most talked about matter during the day. Opinion seemed general that the bill will pass.

NORTH CAROLINA NEWS

The Dukes of Durham have given ten thousand dollars more to Trinity College.

Col J. S. Carr sent his check for \$50 as a Thanksgiving offering, for the benefit of the Soldiers' Home at Raleigh.

Stanly News: Good Farming; Mr. J. C. Parker, two miles west of this place, raised 1,000 bushels of corn on a two-horse farm.

The plan of having a North Carolina building at the World's Fair has been abandoned. The ladies who undertook the task of raising the money found they could not do so.

Alamance Gleaner: No county in North Carolina is making greater progress in stock raising than Alamance, in fact, she is the leader now, and the business will bring much money to the county. Alamance is proud of her horses, cattle and other stock.

Three men were frozen to death near Newbern, a few nights ago. They spent the night on a capsized boat. Another of the party attempted to swim ashore and was drowned. Two others were rescued after being exposed fifteen hours.

State Chronicle: While Mr. Allen Byrd, treasurer of Harnett county, was absent from his home, he left a trunk containing \$1,000 of the county funds in his house, in the charge of his aged father and mother. A few nights ago thieves went to the place and carried off all the money.

The Hotel Zinzendorf at Winston was completely destroyed by fire on the 24th instant, at 11 o'clock, a. m. No lives were lost. It caught from the laundry and hard wind blew it into the house. Some furniture and most of the guests' baggage and papers were saved. The board of directors met at 4 o'clock and resolved it to be the sense of the board to rebuild as soon as practicable. The loss is estimated at about \$130,000; insurance on building, \$100,000.
