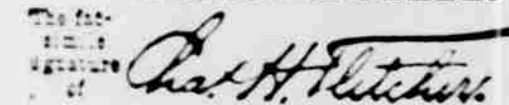

Starbuck's Opinion.

BY REQUEST HE GIVES HIS VIEWS ON THE TAX LAW.

Judge Starbuck, in his charge to the grand jury at Wilkes court, by request, gave his opinion concerning the tax law passed by the last Legislature. The Chronicle gives the following points from his explanation:

1. All taxes become due the first Monday in September.
2. The Sheriff is required to be in his office in Wilkesboro during the month of September for the purpose of receiving taxes.
3. During the month of October the Sheriff must spend one day at least in some stated place in each township, after giving fifteen days notice, for the purpose of receiving taxes.
4. After the first day of November the Sheriff can levy upon property for taxes.
5. All persons who fail to pay their taxes on or before the first day of November, are liable to indictment, and it is the duty of the Sheriff to report all such delinquents to the Judge at next term of the court, the Solicitor to the grand jury, and the grand jury must present bills, and it found guilty such delinquents are liable to a fine of \$500 and imprisonment.

From this explanation it will be seen, that if any one fails to pay his or her taxes by the first of November, he or she will be indicted for misdemeanor under the new law. It would be well to remember this.

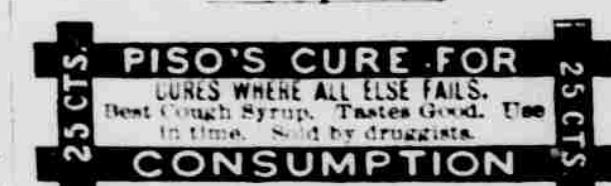

STATE NEWS.

Raleigh has voted \$50,000 in bonds for street improvements.

Alamance Gleaner: The mills in Alamance are all running on full time and most of them have plenty of orders to run on for several months. Good news.

Oxford Orphans' Friend: If you want to see a pretty sight look into our dining rooms at meal times and see 210 children standing at the back of their chairs and saying grace, and then sitting down to a good square meal.

Wilson Advance: The sales of tobacco on this market for the month of August footed up 1,217,005 pounds. This was not quite up to the record of last year but when it is remembered that the season is fifteen days later, then it shows up remarkably well.

Seventeen counties in North Carolina have a frontage on the ocean or tributary sounds and bays and fisheries. The total estimated value of the fisheries at Wilmington is \$185,000. During the past year there have been 5,000,000 mollets caught there, valued at \$125,000. Other fish taken were: 5,000 pounds of herring, 2,500 pounds of blue fish, 10,000 pounds of menhaden, 20,000 pounds of perch, 37,000 pounds of shad, 18,000 pounds of rock fish and 1,000,000 of all other kinds. In addition to this 500,000 crabs were caught, 500 bushels of shrimps, 1,000 turtles, 12,500 bushels of clams, 5,000 bushels of oysters and 2,000 pounds of sturgeon, says Southern States, Baltimore.

Charlotte Observer: The graded schools of Charlotte opened last Monday, and in yesterday's paper it was stated that the attendance was 1,706—1,073 at the white school and 633 at the colored, an increase at the former school of 173 over the opening day last year, and of 122 at the latter. The opening day attendance is never full. All over town there are children who are not quite ready yet, but who will report during the next few weeks. It is quite safe to expect that the graded school attendance in Charlotte this year will be considerably over 2,000. This, with the private schools in the city and the suburban schools about town would indicate that, progress in all things.

Greater New York.

New York on next new year's day will be a city of 167,000 buildings, of which 130,000 are residences. It will have 1,300 miles of streets and 700 miles of sewers. Its people usually consume 10,200,000 gallons of ale, beer and porter, and 100,000 arrests are made each year for intoxication and disorderly conduct. There are 1,186 places of worship, and the receipts of theatres and music halls are \$2,500,000 annually. There are 125 miles of wharfage, 49,000 registered vehicles, 712 newspapers, 166 banking houses and 4,500 acres in public parks. The public debt will be \$66 for each person, while the assessed valuation of the greater city is \$2,746,882,942. The place will be 35 miles long and 19 miles at its greatest expansion. Within its boundary can be found the height of civilization and architecture, and also country as wild as the West. The island of Manhattan was once bought for \$24. The real estate of Greater New York could not now be bought for \$5,000,000,000. Wild geese and ducks are shot within city limits.

IMPORTANT TO DELINQUENT TAX PAYERS.

SHERIFF REQUIRED TO REPORT DELINQUENTS TO JUDGE.

Delinquent Tax Payers will please read as below, Sections 52 and 53 of the Revenue Law, ratified the 9th day of March, 1897, and avoid the costs and penalty imposed therein by paying their taxes without further delay.

Sec. 52. That it shall be and is hereby made the duty of the Sheriff of each county in the State to make diligent inquiry and report to the Judge at each term of the Criminal Court held in the county following the time when the license tax and taxes provided for in schedules A, B and C of this act should have been paid as to whether or

not he has received taxes and other taxes have been paid by all persons or corporations liable for the same, and to make out a list of all delinquents. And it shall be the duty of the Judge to submit the list of the delinquents to the solicitor to the end that such delinquents may be presented for such delinquency in the manner provided in the next section of this act.

Sec. 53. That such persons or corporations who are liable to pay the license tax or taxes provided for in schedules A, B and C of this act and the machinery act, and shall fail to pay the same as provided by law shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and punished by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars or imprisoned not exceeding six months.

Schedules A, B and C cover all taxes levied. Don't make the mistake in thinking that it only applies to special taxes, such as License, Merchant's, Livery Stables and the like, but it applies TO ALL TAXES.
