# OUR STATE UNIVERSITY.

The Fall Term of the University  
of North Carolina will close on De-  
cember 23rd. In some respects it  
is the most remarkable session this  
institution has ever had. It has en-  
rolled 485 students not including  
the Summer School. The health of  
the student body proper has been  
exceptionally good, and all precau-  
tions have been taken by competent  
sanitary experts to see that no con-  
ditions exist harmful to the health of  
the young men who gather there.

The sound of the hammer and the  
spectacle of two new buildings rising  
on the campus gives an air of growth  
and progress to the old classic spot.  
Quite a large number of new stu-  
dents are expected at the opening  
of the Spring Term on January 2nd.  
Scholarships for this Term are ex-  
hausted, but the University will ex-  
tend generosity in dealing with needy  
students who wish an education.  
The loan funds are still available and  
will be up to Dec. 25th. All stu-  
dents wishing to enter the Universi-  
ty for the Spring Term should  
correspond with President Alder-  
man before that date.
