Antimeny is a white, very brittle metal, of laminated or crystalline texture. It fuses at a low temperature and readily vaporizes. It is not used in the pure state, but it forms several valuable alloys and compounds. The most important alloys of antimony are type metal, britannia, pewter, and antifriction metals. Type metal consists, essentially of lead and antimony, often with the addition of small quantities of tin and nickel or copper. Britannia is a white-metal alloy of antimony with tin, copper and bismuth, and is much used for tableware. Pewter is a similar alloy, but it contains a smaller percentage of antimony than beautiful.


