hol for working purposes. With the gradual fulfillment of his prophecy he would probably expect a very appreciable weakening of the resistance to temperance crusades, since the opposition has much to say now of and to the financial interests involved in the liquor business. It appeals to grain raisers, hop growers and vineyardists. It shows that through the operation of breweries and distilleries these people derive an incom which in some cases constitutes the whole income. Their interests are thus brought into a combination with the manufacturing interests, and they are treated as direct interests, which are much more easily appraised and made more important to the investor and farmer than the losses from the excessive use of alcoholic drinks in in-

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dividual cases, But Dr. Crothers proposes to de away to a large extent with the need for the appeal. He would encourage the production of materials out which alcohol could be made by creating a tremendous demand for it as a substitute for electricity and steam. With the financial and industrial interests thus cared for, he thinks that there would be an inevitable decline in its use as a beverage, and he be-lieves that the only thing that is re-

is the invention of suitable engines.

This is by no means the first time that we have heard of the possibilities of a large increase in the industrial uses of alcohol. They were much disussed in connection with the legislation concerning denatured alcohol, the field for inventive genius is open, and inventors produce the desired results it will be easy to secure manufacturing plants, whether second-hand fistilleries are obtainable or not. to the effect on the drink habit we cannot say. If there were nothing to onsider but a substitution that should leave profits unaffected the change might be easily accomplished, but obviously that is not the entire problem.
