BOUNDARY LINE COMMISSION OUT

Pembina, N. D., June 11.—Another boundary line commission has been sent out by the federal government from this point to work from the Red river to the Rocky mountains. The first party was sent to survey the boundary line across northern Minnesota.

O. B. French is in charge of the party that will go across northern North Dakota to the Rockies. This summer there will be a biological survey of the Red river, this survey being in charge of Dr. R. T. Young of the state university. He will cover the river from Fargo to the boundary line with Grand Forks as the base of operations.

OPponents Circulate False Report to Create Sentiment Among Credulous Ones that Gas Franchise is for a Long Term.

Statements have been circulated with the intention of influencing a certain class of voters, to the effect that the gas franchise is for a term of twenty-five years. That statement is not true, the gas ordinance submitted to the voters at the special election today provides that it runs for a term of ten years. At three polling places this morning several voters asked particularly as to the truth of the statements which had been made to them and the clause in the ordinance as to its term of expiration was read for them—that the gas franchise only runs for a term of ten years.

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Election officers say the fact that the polls do not close until 9 o'clock this evening is not conducive to early voting. The bulk of the voters will be cast late this afternoon and this evening, after supper. Those who are watching the trend of affairs say the indications point to a good vote being cast as it is believed the bulk of the voters believe that an issue of great importance to the general welfare and development of the city of Moorhead rests on this election.

Pursuant to the state law, this being election day, the saloons are all closed and will remain closed until the usual opening hour tomorrow morning.

CITY COUNCIL DOINGS

Harris Bros. Awarded Contract for Supplying Light and Water Plant With Coal for Next Year.
The first act of the city council at the regular meeting held at the city hall last night was to open bids for the furnishing of 2,500 tons of coal for the city water and light plant. The Interior Lumber Co. bid \$2.40 per ton, N. J. Olsen Co. \$2.55, Harris Bros. \$2.30. The contract was awarded to the latter firm.

Only one bid was submitted for the drilling of the new six-inch test well and that was by W. G. Packard of Elliott, N. D. \$4 per foot up to 150 feet; \$3.75 up to 200 feet, and \$3.50 up to 250 feet. On motion the bid was rejected and the clerk was instructed to readvertise for bids to be submitted on or before June 28.

In response to a communication and request from the Civic club of Moorhead, permission was given the club to place suitably-designed boxes at the street corners for the collection of old paper and rubbish which may accumulate in the streets.

E. L. Platen was elected city auditor, vice Mr. Kittelard who has resigned on account of his leaving the city to take charge of interests in the west.

J. A. Hunnstein was granted a license to sell ice cream and dairy products according to the ordinances of the city.

All the sand is taken off and dumped into the ditches and then covered with loose dirt. The road is being rounded up in the shape and as soon as it is smoothed with a roller, it will be covered with a coating of gravel and what has been a very bad place of a much-traveled road will be in splendid condition.
