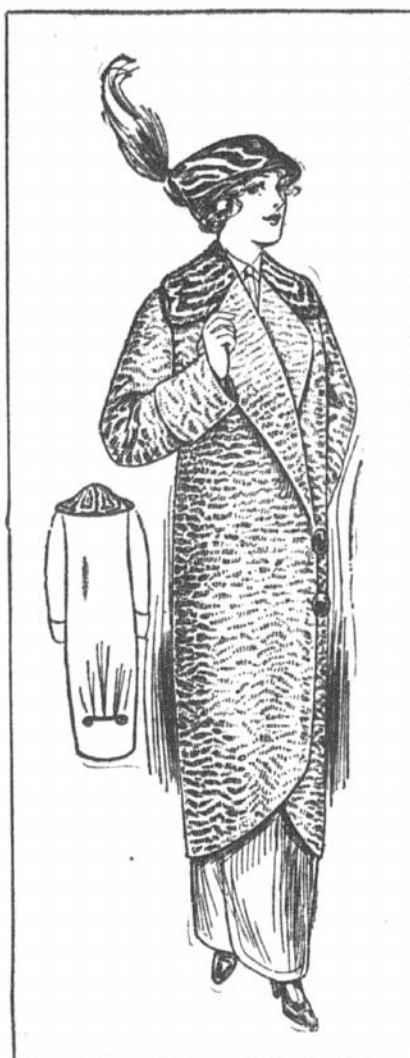

CHARGE ROADS
DISCRIMINATE

COMMERCIAL CLUB WILL TAKE MATTER OF ALLEGED DISCRIMI-NATION IN FREIGHT RATES BE-FORE INTERSTATE COMMERCE COMMISSION.

There will be a hearing before the Interstate Commerce Commission in this city some time in the near future if the plans of the local commercial club go through. The question to be taken up is the matter of railroad discrimination in freight rates, to points along the border of North Dakota and Minnesota.
The shippers of Fargo have always had to pay a considerably higher rate than those of Moorhead though the distance which the railroads haul the goods is exactly the same, as they are brought to the same freight yards. There has been considerable agitation previous to this regarding the matter, but the Fargo shippers got only a small reduction on the coal rates, nothing else.
The other towns along the line will be asked to co-operate with Fargo in urging the complaint before the com-mission, on the charge of discrimina-tion.
