CHARGE EMBEZZLED MAIL

Anfield Shiflet, Rural Carrier, Arrested on Charge of Opening Mail Matter.

U. S. Marshal J. F. Shea returned from Carrington last night, where he went to arrest Anfield Shiflet, rural mail carrier, who is accused of embezzling \$1,000. Shiflet was put under \$1,000 bond, which he furnished and the case will come up at the next session of the grand jury.

A short time ago a considerable quantity of opened letters, catalogues, and all sorts of mail matter was unearthed in a small pit on Shiflet's property. An investigation followed, and Shiflet was arrested. Postoffice Inspector Geo. Chase is now at Carrington investigating the matter further. He will talk with the patrons along the route, and gather all the evidence possible.

Shiflet was not the regular carrier on the route, but was acting as substitute.

These he and friends of Lord Cowdray, it is believed, think might be injured were the United States to forcibly interfere in Mexico. The possibility of a fight with the Rockefeller oil interests in Mexico is believed to make them fearful of great influence by the American government.

WILL LEAD THE MOVEMENT

Team of Twelve From A. C. and Fargo College to Promote Forward Movement in Casselton.

This morning a team of twelve men from the state agricultural college and Fargo college left for Casselton, where they will take the leadership in a forward movement among the boys there. The purpose of this movement is to aid the boys of the town, through the co-operation of the local citizens who are interested, in perfecting a scheme whereby they can secure for themselves better amusements, of the non-commercialized sort, wholesome athletics for all of the boys in the town, not just the few that "make" teams, and a cleaner, more manly, moral life. The plan is not to form a separate organization, but merely to make a wider use of the existing organizations of church and school. The movement is distinctly christian in spirit; it is the work of upbuilding, through the initiative of the boys themselves, a higher standard of morals, and a more healthy social life.

The team is composed of Clair Coding and George Stuckey of Fargo college, and from the A. C. David Sonquist, George Gustafson, Dean Mendenhall, Clarence Williams, Theodore Stoer, William Mendenhall, Earl Yurinek, William Porter, Alfred Matteson and Ray Sweetman.

Local committees of boys and citizens are in charge of the arrangements in Casselton. The team will return Sunday night.

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BELIEVES END OF SALOON AT HAND

JUDGE POLLACK, WHO RETURNED THIS MORNING FROM GREAT CONVENTION AT COLUMBUS, O., BELIEVES DAYS OF AMERICAN SALOON ARE NUMBERED.

Judge Pollack returned this morning from the convention of the National Anti-Saloon League at Columbus, O. This was one of the largest conventions of its kind ever held in the United States, and there was particular interest shown in the working of the prohibition law in North Dakota, this state being one of the pioneer states to adopt prohibition.

Judge Pollack was one of the principal speakers at the convention, and there was present heard with interest his account of the working out of the North Dakota law, its efficient enforcement, and the prospects for the future.

In discussing the convention this morning, Judge Pollack said:

"When you see representatives of all shades of thought, both political and religious, a unit upon one question, namely, the extermination of the American saloon, you can tell that the end is certainly at hand. It will be well worth the time of anyone to read all account of the convention recently held at Columbus, O. I think every state in the union was represented. North Dakota was much in evidence. Everyone was inquiring how we were proceeding with our law. Governor Hanna made a fine impression in his address on Wednesday evening. Governor Hodges, democratic governor of Kansas, with ex-Governor Hanley of Indiana, divided time with Governor Hanna. Over 4,000 were attending.

"The convention passed resolutions urging congress to submit an amendment to the constitution of the United States forever prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors as a beverage, in any place over which floats the American flag."

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
