Young Woman Sues South American Millionaire for \$500,000 for Breach of Promise

The ardent South American temperance of Octavio Guinle, believed to be a millionaire representative in New York city of a large exporting firm in Brazil, was the cause of his being haled to court just as he was about to board a steamer for Europe. Miss Monica T. Borden, a young woman of 23, began suit against him for \$500,000 for breach of promise. She had him taken to court, where he was asked to put up bail of \$50,000. Not getting it at once he was temporarily restrained. The sum given for the young woman is one of the largest asked in a breach of promise case. But she insists that since the man was a millionaire he would be able to pay that. In fact, she said, his income was not less than \$500,000 a year and he would not miss \$500,000. Guinle was caught the day before the wedding, according to the young woman. She said that all arrangements had been made for a wedding in a church near her home. When she saw her intended last night he was packing his goods ready to go to Europe. He showed her a cablegram from his father, asking him to do nothing until he had consulted with her.
