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FRED SIMMONS WAS ARRESTED

Crookston, Minn., June 2.—Following the alleged confession of Alec LaPlante that he set fire to the Grand opera house in Crookston early last Wednesday morning, Fred Simmons, one of the proprietors of the Lyric theater, was arrested, charged with instigating the offense. In his statement LaPlante implicates Simmons to the extent of having hired him to do the job. Both arrests were ordered by the instance of Deputy State Fire warden Martin of St. Paul, who, with a detective from that city, has been investigating rumors which have been circulating around for several days, that the Lyric theater was to be burned down by the grand jury which was convened yesterday.

The case is one of the most sensational that has developed in this city for a long time, and the numerous friends of Fred Simmons are exceedingly loath to accept any statement of the alleged firebug, LaPlante, that he had anything to do with the offense charged. Simmons has resided in Crookston for many years and practically all that time has been engaged in business here.

Bonds in Simmons' case were fixed in the sum of \$1,500, which he had no difficulty in furnishing with ample security. He was in custody but a short time, and promptly released upon bail being presented. The case was adjourned until June 10.
